DOONAHILL CHONNOUE (PHORTLAIR) NOTICE TO OWNERS OF LAND IN COUNTY WATERFORD LOCAL GOVERNMENT (SANITARY SERVICES) ACT, 1948

The attention is drawn to the fact that under Section 34 of the above-mentioned Act, which prevents the use of land for camping in the County of Waterford without the Owner first having obtained the necessary permission to do so.

In this respect the Landowner's attention is drawn to the following details:—

(1) Land which is the site of a temporary dwelling and which is within 100 yards of the site and of which the occupier is the owner of the site shall be used for camping.

(2) The Owner of land which is not less than 100 yards from the site shall be the occupier thereof.

(3) The expression "temporary Dwelling" means any (a) tent or (b) van or other conveyance whether on wheels or not; or (c) shed, hut or similar structure; or (d) vessel on inland waters.

used for human habitation or constructed or adapted for such use.

In their own interests owners of land in County Waterford are advised to communicate with the Secretary of the County Council before using or allowing the use of their land for camping. Failure to comply with this requirement may result in the prosecution of the offender and the subsequent removal of the temporary dwelling.

G.A.A. NOTES

AN ALL-IRELAND LOST BY ONE STROKE OF THE BALL

What Of The Inexplicable Failure Of The Selectors

—Asks Commentator

I think that the man who said that the result was more disappointing than disappointing very aptly described the feelings of many of our readers when they read the news of the defeat of the All-Ireland hurling final.

It is difficult to understand why all Ireland that we could have had should have been lost to a few blunders on the field and the inexplicable failure of the selectors to make any attempt to remedy the obvious weaknesses until it was too late.

Over confidence too, on the part of our supporters, who were not so unmentioned and this was noted last week must have had an effect on the players who were being told everywhere that they were certain winners against this inexperienced Kilkenny team.

Now I have blamed everyone, the team, the selectors, and our supporters and that just about makes it a real "waterford" defeat, but in analysing the defeat I don't think could excuse any of the three from the blame. We lost it between us.

One good feature of the post-match discussions on the final is that our supporters are anxious to sympathise with more than blame some of the players who showed a lapse of form and who did not hurl as brilliantly as we have become accustomed to see them do in their games during the past twelve months. This is a welcome departure from what we normally listen to when the team is beaten and it shows that even the more ignorant supporters are becoming more educated to the fact that an "odd" day cannot take from the reputation of a good hurler.

All players have a "off day" now and then and it was most unfortunate for Waterford and more so for themselves that a number of our players hit their "off" day on the day of the final. They all hurried to their best form—repeated the hurling mistakes they had made in the games during the past twelve months and all other leading hurling counties—hurling in the final.

It was a pity that the team was not able to turn out their best on the day of the final. And so another All-Ireland has been lost—by not more than a stroke of the ball.

The future, however, is as bright as ever and every loyal Waterfordian who knows the capabilities of their great team will hope to see them playing in form and properly handled can come back and win the All-Ireland again.

It would be disastrous now if any of the people responsible for the team's defeat in the final were to be criticised. This team is finished—this was their first important defeat in the final.

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BALLYDOUFF'S TITLE

On last Thursday evening when the entire county went to the hurling final at Walsh Park, Ballyduff, who had come through the West in the style of champions, met and defeated the county champions, Mount Sion, in the under sixteen hurling final.

And so, almost unknown to the rest of the county this brilliant young Ballyduff team were making their mark in the history of hurling by taking the first ever juvenile title to the West.

As well as being a great victory for Ballyduff and for the West, this must also be regarded as a victory for the Avonmore juvenile hurling team which provided the competition which enabled this former school team to develop their team work and improve their hurling.

The victory has been described as a bit of a surprise, as Ballyduff were not expected to produce the more attractive clash.

Ever since Tourin and St. Mary's became destined to meet, this game has become the subject of discussion in all corners of the division and in this part of the West the game has assumed the importance of a County final and both sides regard it as being their biggest obstacle to the title.
