Waste Collection Hike Passed By Co. Council

Householders in Co. Waterford are to be hit with a 57% increase in refuse charges while ratepayers are to be faced with a 7.5% rise on January first, it emerged at Waterford County Council's estimate meeting last Friday.

The charges will see ordinary waste collections rise to £4.75 (6 euro) and recycling to be charged at £2.40 (3 euros).

The size of the increases were defended by County Manager Donal Connolly who said because of the plans to have collections of recyclables every second week the overall increase will not be substantial.

Ratepayers in the county, however, will be hit by the maximum increase in the county rates which Mr. Connolly revealed was due to a net deficit in the estimates of £2.8 m.

Meanwhile, the new refuse collections will see householders pay around £30 extra over this year. However, Mr. Connolly said this was necessary due to the increased

cost of waste management which will almost double from last year.

He also told the councillors that the £2.40 for recyclable's will be imposed for the collection of four bags and not for each bag as was initially feared.

"I see a situation as well where quite a number of people won't even have to put out their ordinary waste for collection every second week due to the amount put into recycling", the County Manager said.

This clearly wasn't accepted by Labour Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, who called for a waiver system for those on low incomes or on old age pensions.

He was also concerned the goodwill the council had received towards the recycling scheme would be lost with the introduction of the charges.

However, Cllr. John Deasy accused the Labour Councillor of being the most negative voter in the council and of having voted against the estimates for the last five years.

A FARCE

"His justification for voting against the estimates is fascinating but frankly it's a farce", Cllr. Deasy said. "He's just looking for an excuse to vote against them. When it comes to hard decisions on every occasion Cllr. O Ceilleachair runs away like a little girl."

Cllr. Ger Barron came to his Labour colleagues defence, however, saying that Cllr. O Ceilleachair has never been afraid to take on issues in the council.

"In my time here, he's taken on a number of issues and I think it's very childish of Cllr. Deasy to make remarks like that", he said.

The Kilmacthomas representative stated that he too had a problem with the charges increasing for ordinary waste collections.

"I brought forward a waiver scheme for people on low incomes", he said "and I'm disappointed that consideration is not being given to that. I'm also worried that if we introduce this charge, it will do away with the goodwill we have seen in the last

few weeks for recycling."

The additional charges were supported, however, by Cllr. Tom Higgins who gave the County Manager his full support.

"The County Manager envisages that the ordinary waste will be collected every two weeks", Cllr. Higgins said, "so instead of costing the average person £12 per month it'll be £15.30 which is only an increase of £3.30."

LACK OF FUNDING

Meanwhile, Cllr. Nora Flynn was critical of the Government's lack of fund-

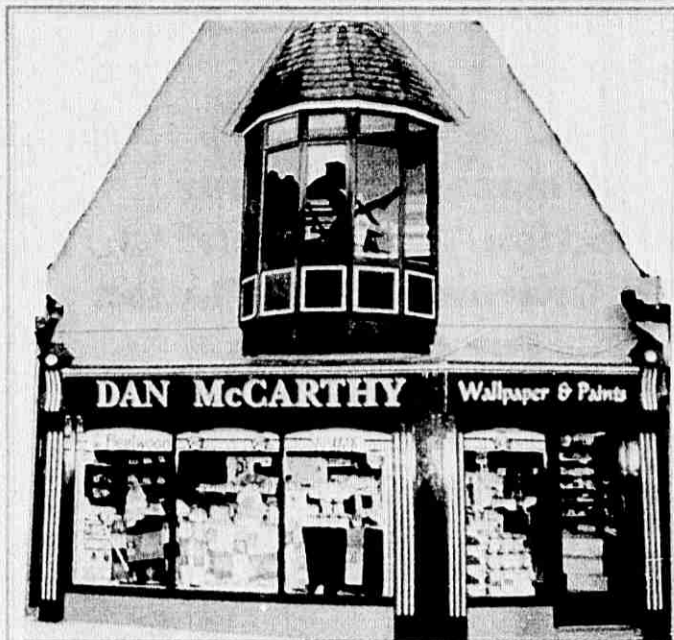

**Tanaiste Turns
Down Task
Force For West
Waterford**

Despite the jobs losses which have hit West Waterford in recent months, a task force will not be set up for the area, according to Junior Minister Tom Kitt who was answering a question in the Dail last week raised by Deputy Austin Deasy.

Minister Kitt said the Tanaiste is "confident that the efforts of the industrial development agencies under her remit, including the County Enterprise Board and the involvement of local business interests, will see Waterford continue to develop as a county offering excellent job opportunities."

While numerous calls were made locally for the setting up of a task force to search for other opportunities for those made redundant in Cadena, Stafford Miller and Dungarvan Crystal, Minister Kitt said a task force would

undermine existing efforts.

"The combined actions of the development agencies and the county development board represent the best approach to the immediate and longer term development interests of the area", he said.

"The establishment of a task force would only duplicate the efforts already being made and undermine the important work being carried out at local level".

Minister Kitt also said during the past five years almost 3,000 jobs were announced in IDA assisted companies in Waterford City and County and that a new company set

up in the city will create 400 jobs in the next four years.

However, Deputy Deasy said that West Waterford is a separate entity to Waterford City.

"Parts of West Waterford are located up to 50 miles from the city. There is a major unemployment in West Waterford which I would like the Department to establish a task force to address", he said.

"I would ask the Tanaiste to establish a task force because the county enterprise board does not have the clout to create the type of employment needed", Deputy Deasy said.

However, Minister Kitt replied that he had outlined the Tanaiste's position but he said "we will ensure the relevant agencies do their utmost for the region."

**Dungarvan Still In
The Running For
A Government
Department**

Despite speculation that Waterford City's bid for a Government Department has collapsed, hopes for the locating of part of the Office of Public Works in Dungarvan still appear to be alive.

Decentralisation looked to be on the cards for both Dungarvan and Waterford City ever since June of last year when Deputy Brendan Kenneally issued a statement on the issue.

However, now since the move to Waterford City has fallen through, there has been mounting speculation about a similar outcome occurring in Dungarvan.

But, Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea, who raised the issue in the Dail, said that while no move has, of yet, been confirmed officially, Dungarvan's position is entirely separate to that of the city.

Meanwhile, Deputy Kenneally has also said that while the same concerns do not appear to have been voiced about Dungarvan's prospects "I will continue to press its legitimate case in parallel with Waterford and remain upbeat about the prospects for both locations".

"Indeed, while the delays in the selection of centres to benefit is regrettable," Deputy Kenneally said "my confidence is as high now as it was when I first aired my hopes in this regard back in June of last year."

If Dungarvan was to receive a Department, £25,000 a week would be pumped into the local economy. However, in excess of 120 towns have applied for a lucrative department and confirmation is not likely until after the next general election.

**Waterford Crystal's
Rationalisation
Plans To See Price
Cuts For Suppliers**

Waterford Crystal has demanded a 10 per cent cut in prices from its worldwide network of suppliers and has threatened to impose the price cuts if they do not respond by the end of this week.

The Crystal company said it intended the cut in supplier prices as a short-term measure between now and the end of the year. The company has also said that a price-cut letter had been sent to all its suppliers worldwide.

The companies demand for price-cuts is part of its £40 million rationalisation programme announced two weeks ago. As part of this programme, Waterford Crystal are cutting its workforce in Ireland, the UK and Germany by 1,400 jobs.

Most of these are concentrated in the UK but at least 100 are expected to go in its Dungarvan and Waterford plants. The Dungarvan plant will also face two one-week shut downs between now and the end of the year.

The Local Employment Service now entering its fifth year in existence in West Waterford has become a one stop shop for those who are looking for employment and those who are willing to provide it.

In the last four years some of the people who have availed of the service have been placed in all types of work throughout the county and beyond. Others have received training, which has helped them on the road in obtaining the type of job they were looking for. Some have taken up apprenticeships and a large number have taken the big step of becoming self-employed.

The Local Employment Service has also provided guidance and help to those seeking information, those who needed help in C.V. preparation and interview techniques and to those who simply wanted direction in whatever career they had chosen.

On the employer side the LES has provided a recruitment service which can save a business valuable time and resources by helping them recruit the right personnel.

John Supple who is the Mediator with the Local Employment Service in West Waterford knows the jobseekers on an individual basis. This is of great benefit, as applicants are screened and only those most suited to the job re-

quirements and those who have shown interest in the particular job are forwarded to the employer for interview.

2001 has been a particularly busy year for the Local Employment Service in West Waterford explains Mr. Supple.

We have had a steady increase in clients wishing to use the service throughout the year and this continued during the summer months which was the opposite to the previous two summers as these months would be classed as our quiet period explains John.

On the positive side we also have shown an increase in numbers who are starting up their own business. These people, with the help of the Back To Work Enterprise Allowance Scheme and in some cases grant aid will be employers of the future, so great credit is due to them to have taken on such a responsibility, says John.

Co-ordinated by Waterford Leader Partnership and under the auspices of FAS, the LES is ideally positioned as a focal point for both employers and job-seekers and can contribute to making real inroads in recruitment and placements within the county.

THE WAY WE LIVE: HISTORY

WARS AND REVOLUTIONS

More than any other time in history, the early 20th century was an age of wars and revolutions. In South Africa, from 1899 to 1902, Boer farmers (descended from Dutch settlers) rebelled against British colonial rule.

In the Far East, a war broke out between Russia and Japan in 1904. Both wanted to be the strongest power in East Asia. The last Chinese emperor was forced to give up power by rebels who wanted a new, republican form of government which would give more power to ordinary people.

In Europe, rival nations fought a devastating war from 1914 to 1918, shattering old beliefs about how societies should be run.

In Russia, Communist revolutionaries overthrew the government in 1917. Then, from 1924 to 1939, brutal Communist dictator Stalin reorganised the country in a series of Five Year Plans.

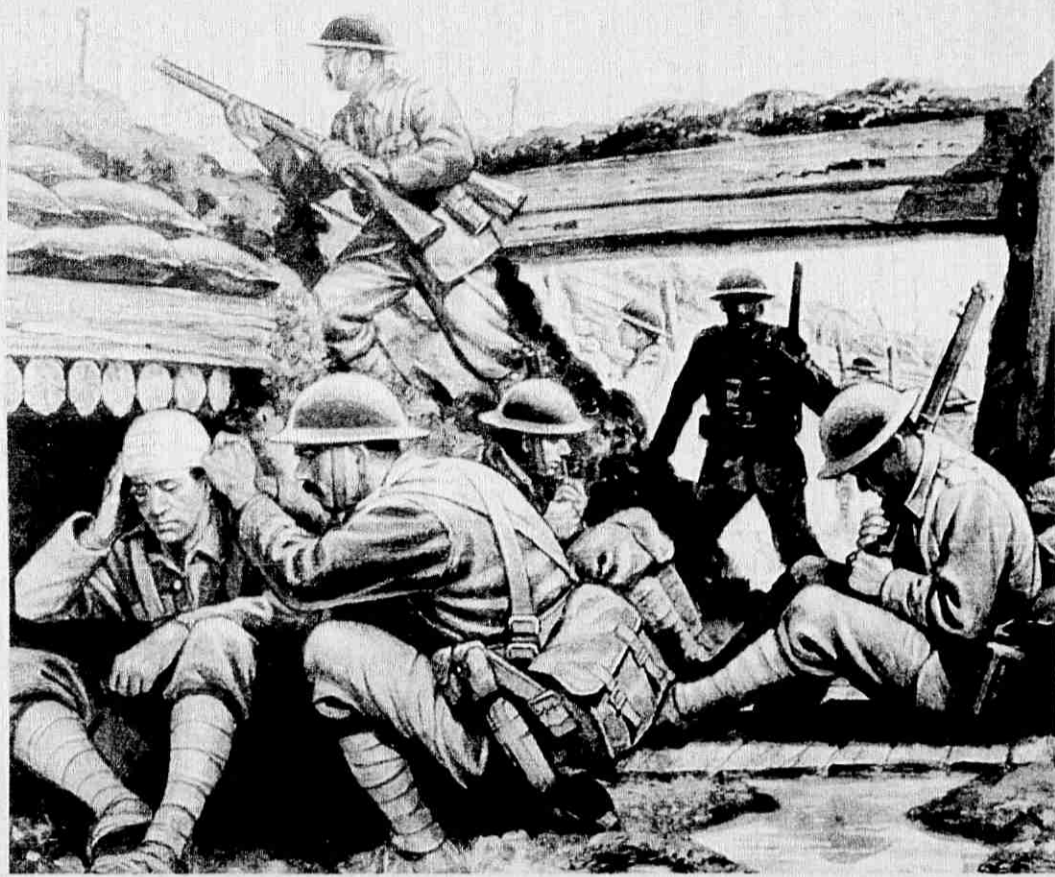
WORLD WAR I

By 1900, the strongest European nations — Britain, Germany and France — were jealous of each other's industrial wealth, and envied each other's colonies overseas.

They also quarrelled over the future of Serbia and other Balkan states.

In 1914, war broke out between them. Germany, Austria-Hungary and Turkey fought against Britain, Russia and France.

Other European nations, plus the USA, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa, soon joined in. Fighting lasted until 1918, when Germany surrendered.

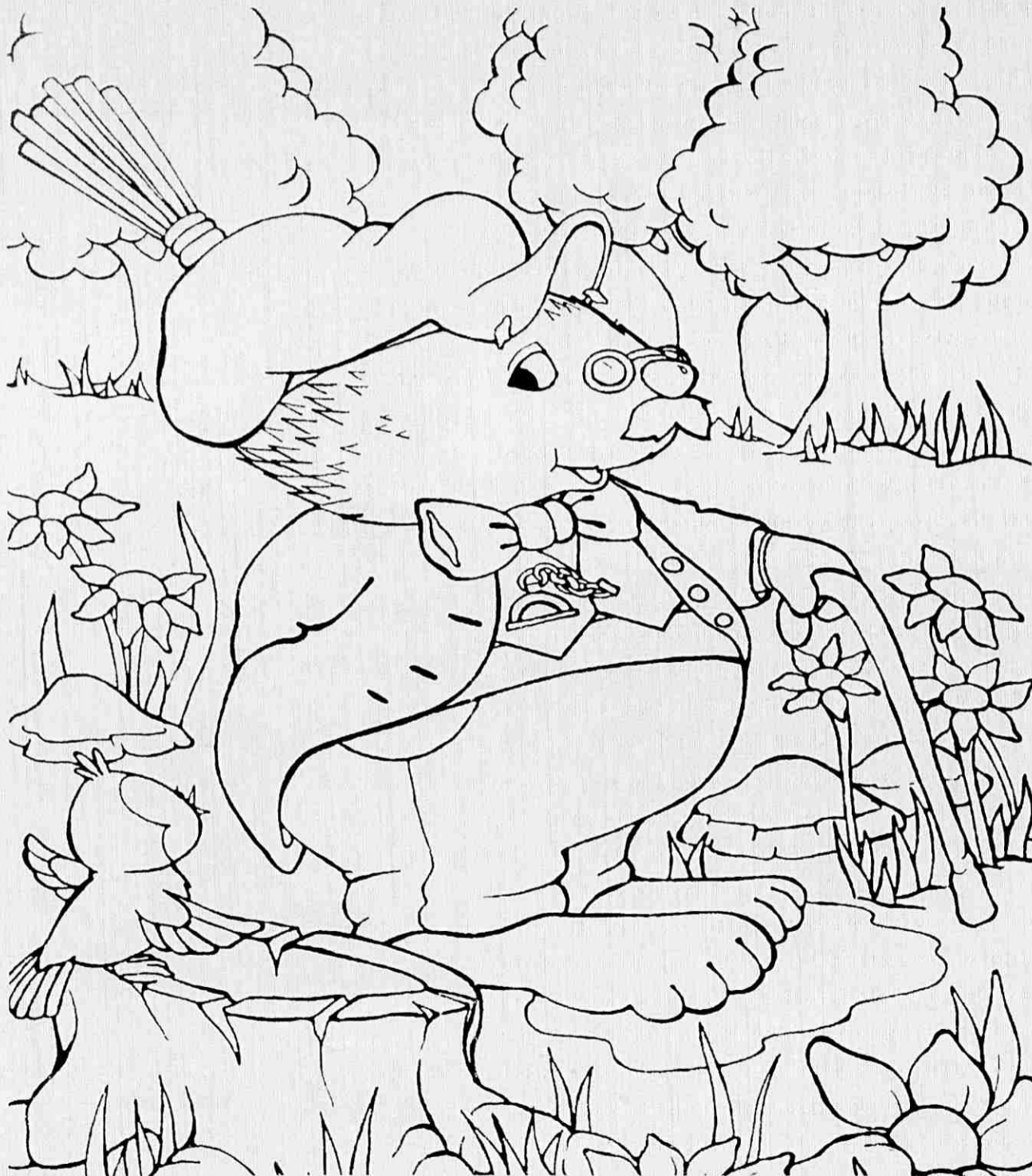


The outbreak of the 1914-18 war was marked by massive troop movements, as British and French armies hurried to stop the Germans reaching the Channel coast. Both sides met face to face in Belgium and northern France.

They dug lines of trenches (deep narrow holes in the ground) to shelter their troops from cannon and machine-gun fire. The opposing armies remained in their trenches, gaining — or losing — very little territory, for the next four years.

Dungarvan to Host Bahamas During Special Olympics 2003

At a spectacular launch in the RDS in Dublin last Sunday, the allocation of National teams to Host Towns for the Special Olympics, World Games, Ireland 2003 was announced. Dungarvan was allocated the team from the Bahamas and will play host to a party of 47 Athletes and Coaches from the sun-drenched Caribbean Island.

Waterford City was matched with Jamaica, while Carrick-On-Suir, Rathgormack and Clonea Power will combine to look after the Athletes from Slovakia and Tramore will entertain the Philippines. Dungarvan was represented at the impressive ceremony by Cllr. Teresa Wright, Chairperson of Dungarvan Urban District Council, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, Chairman of the Host Town Committee, Mr. Jack Stephenson, Manager, Dungarvan Branch, Bank of Ireland and Tom Keith, Dungarvan UDC.

Supported by Bank of Ireland as part of their Premier Sponsorship of the World Games, the Host Town Programme is a central part of the Special Olympics, World Games, 7,000 athletes and 2,000 Coaches from 158 Countries will be travelling to Ireland for the Games, the biggest sporting event in the world in 2003.

In addition, up to 28,000 family members will arrive in Ireland in conjunction with the Games and will be accommodated with an appropriate number of families in the Dublin area, as close

as possible to the sports venues.

Among the high-profile guests at the launch were An Taoiseach, Bertie Ahern, T.D., Denis O'Brien, Chairman of the 2003 Games; Mike Soden, Chief Executive Designate of the Bank of Ireland, the Lord Mayors of Belfast and Dublin, numerous other Cathaoirleach and members of Local Authorities, as well as a host of RTE and entertainment personalities including Geraldine Plunkett, Mary McEvoy, Sharon Shannon, Ciarán Goss and Brian Kennedy.

Tim Shriver, Chief Executive of the Special Olympics Worldwide and son of the founder of the Games, Eunice Kennedy Shriver, was unable to be present, but sent a videotaped message to the huge assembly. Also present representing the athletes were Troy Forde King from Canada, Serena Sylvia from Italy and Noel Hanly from Ireland, the Host Country. The presentation was compared by Flo McSweeney and David Harvey, with the intricate two hour presentation being completed without a hitch.

Speaking at the launch, An Taoiseach said that the Host Town Programme was a major part of the Special Olympics 2003. "The Government has been behind this project all the way," he said, "even to the point of giving £8 million towards the substantial costs. This magnificent spectacle will show the world just how good we are at organising events," he continued, "and of course it will also showcase the country around the world. I confidently expect that this will be the best Special Olympics ever."

This is the first time that the Summer Special Olympics will have been held outside of America and every effort is being made to at least equal, if not surpass what the Americans would produce.

Speaking in the immediate aftermath of the announcement, Cllr. Teresa Wright, Chairperson of Dungarvan

UDC said that she was delighted that Dungarvan had been allocated such a large party and pledged that the Council would facilitate in every way possible the visit of the Special Olympians to the town.

Cllr. Ml. O'Riordan, Chairman of the Host Town Committee said that the submission which had gone in from Dungarvan had obviously impressed the panel and that he was delighted to see such a large party destined for the town. They already had certain ideas of what they would like to do for the visitors, he said, and they will now sit down and prepare a comprehensive plan for the arrival of the 47 special guests.

Jack Stephenson, Manager of the Dungarvan Branch of Bank of Ireland said he was pleased to work with the Dungarvan Committee on one of the finest projects ever to be undertaken in this country. COOKERY CORNER

Pork Pot With Fennel, Garlic and Tomatoes

POT roast of pork with fennel, garlic and tomatoes.

Ingredients:

Serves 4

- 1.5kg boned, rolled and tied loin of pork, rind intact
- Salt and pepper
- 2-3 x 15ml sp dripping
- 2 x 15ml sp Pernod
- 100ml white wine
- 2 large bulbs fennel, quartered
- 12 medium tomatoes, halved
- 16-plus cloves garlic, unpeeled and bruised with back of knife
- 2-3 bay leaves
- 1 or 2 sprigs thyme
- Sprinkle fennel seeds
- 3-4 pieces lemon peel, no pith
- Juice of 1 lemon

Method:

Put a cast-iron pot over a flame to become hot and preheat the oven to 300°F/150°C/gas mark 2.

Rub the pork all over with a little fat or oil. Add the dripping to the hot-pot, allow to smoke slightly and put in the pork loin. Turn and burn the meat for several minutes until the skin turns gold. Lift on to a plate.

Tip off most of the fat and discard, pour in the Pernod and wine. Allow to bubble together, using a whisk to pick up the brown bits at the bottom of the pot.

Return pork to the pot and tuck the fennel, tomatoes, garlic, bay and thyme sprigs around it. Spoon over some of the meat juices, and sprinkle with fennel seed. Put pieces of lemon peel among the vegetables and squeeze lemon juice over everything.

Bring the pot up to a moderate heat, put on the lid and place in the oven. Cook for 2-2 1/2 hours, turning the meat once during this time.

Serve the pork carved into thick slices, with the vegetables around it, plenty of juices and plain boiled potatoes.



Honey-Glazed Carrots For Kids

AN excellent way of persuading stubborn children to eat their carrots – these honey-glazed carrots are also delicious served with roasted meats.

Ingredients:

Serves 4

- 450g carrots, peeled and sliced diagonally
- 20g unsalted butter
- 1/2 x 5ml sp chopped summer savoury or soft thyme leaves
- 1 bay leaf
- Pinch ground nutmeg
- 1 x 15ml sp liquid honey
- Salt and ground black pepper
- 1 x 15ml sp snipped chives

Method:

Place the carrots in a medium-sized saucepan and add just about enough water to cover them. Add the butter, summer

savoury or soft thyme leaves, bay leaf and nutmeg to the saucepan.

Cover the pan and bring the carrot mixture to the boil. Simmer for about six minutes and then remove the lid and increase the heat.

Add the honey to the pan and cook the carrots until all the liquid has evaporated, leaving a shiny glaze on the carrots.

If you want your carrots to be caramelised or golden, you should cook for a little while longer, stirring them from time to time. But when you do this the butter will separate, creating a much more greasy dish.

Season with the salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste and then stir in the snipped chives.

Serve your carrots immediately while they are still hot, with a roast meal of your choice, other seasonal vegetables and gravy.

Crème Anglaise – Proper Custard

THIS recipe will make you come over all wobbly – it's the stuff custard dreams are made of.

Ingredients:

- Makes 500ml/serves 4
- 500ml milk
- Vanilla pod, split open
- 5 egg yolks
- 75g caster sugar

Method:

Put the milk in a saucepan with the split vanilla pod and bring slowly to the boil.

When the milk looks as if it is on the point of boiling, remove from the heat and leave for around 20 minutes – this lets the vanilla flavour the milk.

Lift out the vanilla pod and scrape the little black seeds into the milk with the point of a knife.

Whisk the egg yolks and sugar together until they are thick and pale in colour, then

add the milk to them and stir. Pour the custard into a clean pan, and put over a low heat, stirring almost constantly until it thickens slightly. The consistency should be that of double cream.

On no account let the mixture get too hot – if it boils it will curdle, so remember to keep stirring.

Pour the mixture into a clean bowl and use immediately or cover loosely with clingfilm and cool.

TIP: For a traditional banana custard, add thickly sliced, slightly under-ripe bananas to the custard once you have sieved it, then keep warm for a few minutes while the fruit gives flavour to the sauce.

The slices of fruit will soften slightly, which is why it is best not to use ripe fruit

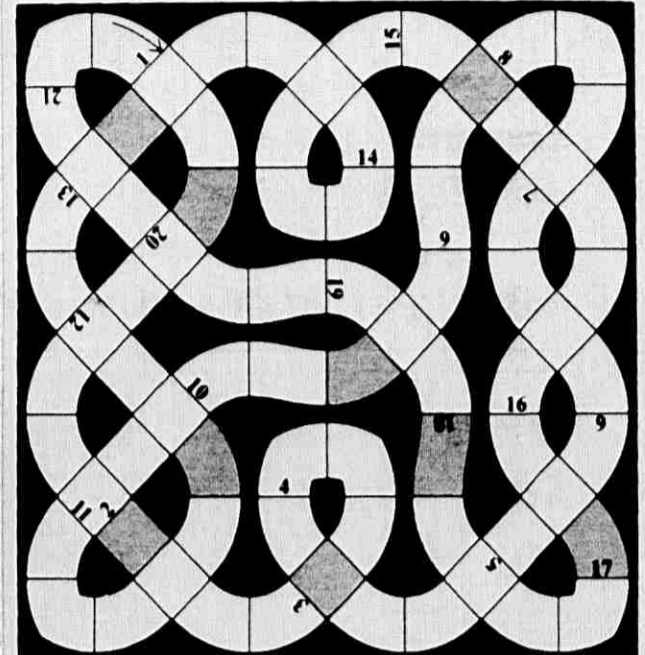

Waterford County Council To Seek £1M For Dungarvan/Youghal Road

Waterford County Council is to seek £2.4 million in funding for four road projects next year - two of which are centred around the West Waterford area, it was revealed at last Friday's estimates meeting.

A million pounds will be sought from the Government for funding on improvements to the Dungarvan to Youghal road while another £1.3 million will be spent on the Dungarvan Ring Road.

However, the level of spending on the upkeep of county roads was described as a "disgrace" by Ardmore representative Cllr. Tom Cronin.

"The upkeep of county roads will only see an increase of £26,000", Cllr. Cronin said. "As far as I'm concerned that's a disgrace. Wages alone are going to double that particular figure."

The councillor went on to say that with the increase in

wages as well as the increase in hiring machinery a large portion of the figures devoted to the upkeep of roads will be spent instead on these other areas.

"We're going back to the same position we were in five or six years ago", he said. "We'll all be looking for roads to be fixed but the money won't be there for them".

Cllr. Nora Flynn concurred with this view saying that when she first became a councillor the roads situation was a disaster and the council "has been playing catchup" ever since.

The issue of public lighting on roads was also raised by Cllr. Ger Barron who said

that the council has seriously fallen behind on the scheme.

"I know of several instances where poles for lighting have been erected for lighting but no lights have been put in place as yet", he said.

Cllr. Mary Green was concerned that due to the failure to provide public lighting a tragedy is only waiting to happen in certain parts of the county.

"The flashing amber lighting to warn traffic to slow down before approaching schools is not available in a number of areas around the county", she said. "I can see a terrible accident occurring because of this. Do we have to wait until there's a tragedy until there's some lighting put up."

Cllr. Green said there are literally some blackspots around the county that needed to be acted upon immedi-

ately.

The County Manager said that the flashing amber lighting outside some schools are operated by time switch and he does not see any reason why the time-switch can't be altered where there are changed circumstances.

"Warning lights at other schools may be provided as well", he said "if the local communities are willing to foot a percentage of the costs involved."

As for the condition of county roads, Mr. Connolly said, he "would have liked to see more money put forward for county roads but this just wasn't available in the current year."

In other grants £30,000 has been granted for the provision of a footpath between the National and Secondary schools in Ring by the department of the Gaeltacht while another £150,000 has been assigned for a road realignment from the secondary school to Helvick.

£5,000 has been put forward for the promotion of road safety and a total of £42,000 has been made available for sign posts with Tallow Hill and Tallow junction included in these.

A further £500,000 has been included for the coast road towards Ballyvoile and £200,000 for resurfacing work at Duckspool.

£13,000 Extra For Repair Of Local Authority Housing

An additional £13,000 will be provided by Waterford County Council for the maintenance and repair of local authority housing but one-off tenants are still finding it difficult to get essential repairs done, it emerged at last Friday's estimates meeting.

Fine Gael Cllr. Paudie Coffey has said that although maintenance and repair of council housing has raised from 206,400 to 219,400, one-off tenants find it very difficult to get any repairs done to their homes.

He said the majority of County Council reserves were devoted to the refurbishment of vacant council houses and he asked could any more money be directed to the repair of tenancy houses.

Stradbally representative Cllr. Tom Cunningham also brought this to the fore saying that an increase of £13,000 towards these essential repairs was simply not enough.

"People who are living in local authority housing for over eleven years will need repairs done to their homes and as I think every councillor here knows, more needs to be put into that", he said.

However, Mr. Connolly said that the insulation and the provision of central heating of houses has been done at a rate of 30 houses a year

over the last two years.

"We're proposing to do another 30 houses in 2002", he said. "The insulation of houses is a programme we intend to continue."

The council also intends to replace windows and doors in 35 houses in 2002 and a similar amount were already completed this year.

"This certainly does eat into the money provided for maintenance and repairs", he said. "but at the same time it's a good investment for the future. We're now putting in PVC windows and doors which are pretty much maintenance free."

The County Manager said he is also looking at employing an extra apprentice to carry out some of the repairs.

The council has already provided an additional 68 houses since October 2000 giving a total of 4,610 houses and 46 demountable dwellings which the vast majority disposed of at "reasonable costs" to former tenants.

A further 4 houses will be completed in January while the number of rented houses are now at 727 and the current number being purchased under the various Purchases Schemes is 395.

These housing schemes include 2 houses which will be built in Old Parish, four in Ring, two in Stradbally and a further four in Kilmac-thomas.

£1.15 Rise In the Cost Of Ordinary Refuse Collection

After what was, at times, a tempestuous debate, Dungarvan Urban Council have imposed a rise of £1.15 (one euro) for the collection of ordinary refuse, while the town rate has increased to £44.60.

Although a charge of £4 (five euros) for ordinary refuse was initially put forward by the County Manager Donal Connolly, this was eventually knocked down following stern opposition from some Councillors.

However, Mr. Connolly has estimated the council's total income at £1.7million and with expenditure at £2.9 million, this left the net deficit to be met by rate payers.

A charge of £2.40 (3 euros) for recycling is also to come on stream in January 1st leaving the town's householders facing an increase for their collections for the first time in two years.

The initial charges were criticised strongly by the council's four Labour Party members but the estimates were defended by Cllrs John Deasy and Damien Geoghegan of Fine Gael.

Indeed, Chairperson of the Urban Council, Cllr. Teresa Wright said that she could not vote for the estimates if such a large rise in refuse charges was imposed and called for a waiver scheme to be introduced for pensioners.

While such a scheme is already in place for pensioners living alone, she said that pensioners living together can also face hardship.

This point was not accepted by Cllr. John Deasy, however, who (as was the case at Waterford County Council's estimates meeting just days before) was vigorous in defence of the estimates.

The Fine Gael councillor asked Cllr. Teresa Wright to

outline the cost of this option and called for councillors with alternatives to show the costs involved "rather than wasting our time".

However, Cllr. Billy Kyne came to his colleagues defence saying that it was the County Managers duty to draw up the estimates.

"It is for the manager to say where the money comes from and where it goes to as he is the expert in that regard," he said.

Cllr. Wright also expressed her "disappointment" at Cllr. Deasy's remarks and said that she has worked within the community and has seen first-hand the hardship that some are suffering.

"I am not suggesting this as an excuse not to vote for the estimates, but because of the hardship these charges would cause in some cases," Cllr. Wright said.

CLLRS ENGAGED IN Pantomime

Responding, Cllr. Deasy said that some councillors were involved in a pantomime "saying no to the estimates each year".

"I live in this town too but I believe if we're going down that road, we should put down an economic level for a waiver system not just for pensioners", he said.

The meeting became heated when Cllr. Lar Hart indicated that he would be opposing the estimates over the future of recycling, which he was concerned would be put in danger by introducing a charge.

However, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan told the council that the Labour Councillor had not voted for the estimates for many years.

Cllr. Hart replied that it was his right to vote against the estimates if he was opposed to a raise in charges, while Cllr. Geoghegan said anyone who opposed the estimates was opposing funding for projects like the playground.

The two councillors then became heated before Cllr. Teresa Wright and Cllr. Michael O'Riordan calmed proceedings.

Shortly afterwards, a 4 euro charge was proposed by Cllr. Kyne, and he asked the County Manager to make a similar move.

Following this a ten minute adjournment was called to give the County Manager time to make up the shortfall of £21,000 that would be lost in income with the reduction of the charges.

When the session resumed Mr. Connolly accepted the reduced charge and said the Government levy of 15 euros per tone of waste disposed by the Urban Council may not cost as much as he had first estimated.

Mr. Connolly also said that because recycling had just begun the amount of waste the Urban Council would put to landfill could only be estimated.

"The Government charges are calculated on a very much trial and error basis," Mr. Connolly said. "Next year very much depends on the success of recycling."

He said the levy could see a charge of £180,000 rather than £200,000 and so no money would be needed to be taken away from other projects.

RATES AFFECTED BY GLANBIA DELAY

Meanwhile, the County Manager revealed that the amount

taken in from rate payers will fall from £81,000 to £77,100 this year while the Urban Council has struck off rates of £183,000 on the former Glanbia site.

Mr. Connolly said that once the development of the Glanbia site goes ahead these rates will once again resume and would be a big boost for the town.

Indeed, Cllr. Deasy said the loss of the Glanbia rates had caused the refuse collection increase, and criticised An Bord Pleanála for the length of time it was taking over a decision on the multi-million pound development.

This led to a decision that the Urban Council would contact An Bord Pleanála and the Government to urge a speedy decision.

8-1 DECISION

Eventually, Cllr. Nuala Ryan proposed the amended book of estimates which was seconded by Cllr. John Deasy and the estimates were passed on a vote of 8-1 with Cllrs Deasy, Ryan, Geoghegan, Wright, Power, Dillon, Kyne, O'Riordan voting in favour and Cllr. Lar Hart voting against.

ing for the recycling scheme and said she was worried that the charge on recycling would see a fall off in support for it.

"I would have no problem with charging £10 a bin for waste that goes to landfill", she said "but I would like to see the charge on recycling reduced. The whole problem is that no Government has the courage to ban non-returnable goods."

This view was echoed by her Fine Gael colleague Cllr. Mary Green who also initially opposed the charges and said she would oppose the estimates on this point. However, she said that the County Manager had addressed a number of her worries and ultimately voted for their adoption.

The Fine Gael councillors, had already met before the estimates, later requested an adjournment for ten minutes after which they came out in favour.

While the Labour Party Councillors along with Independent Councillor Betty Twomey opposed the introduction of the charges, Fine Gael and Fianna Fail who make up the vast majority of the council, grouped together and left the decision a mere formality.

Ultimately, the proposal to pass the estimates was carried on a 19-4 vote with Cllrs Billy Kyne, Betty Twomey, Ger Barron and Fiachra O Ceilleachair voting against on the issue of waste charges.

DECISION CRITICISED

The decision was later criticised by a small group of protesters lead by Tramore Town Commissioner Eddie Walsh.

Mr. Walsh called for the immediate abolition of the refuse tax and for proper funding from the exchequer to local authorities.

"It is quite outrageous that another another local tax should be imposed on ordinary householders under the guise of bin charges," he said.

"Against the background of sleaze and corruption which involved business and prominent politicians ordinary people are not prepared to continue to be a soft touch they have been for twenty years as far as paying the lion's share of taxation is concerned."

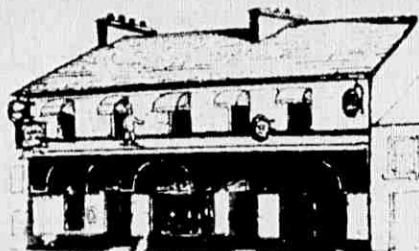

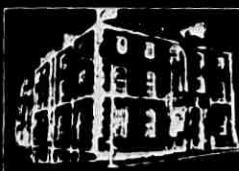

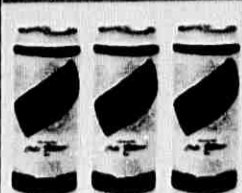

Breast cancer is a common and serious condition. In Ireland approximately 1,700 women are diagnosed with breast cancer every year. Some 650 die from the disease annually. The risk of developing breast cancer increases with age and breast

cancer is the most common killing cancer in women. Breast cancer is rare in women under thirty and occurs most frequently in later life. Men can also develop

breast cancer but it is one hundred times less common than in women. The earlier a cancer is diagnosed and treated, the greater the chance of a cure.

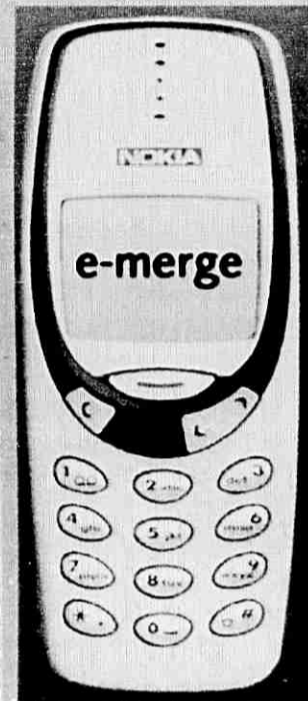

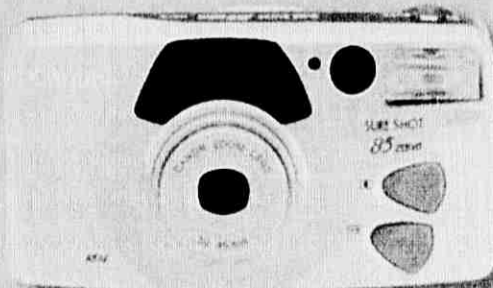

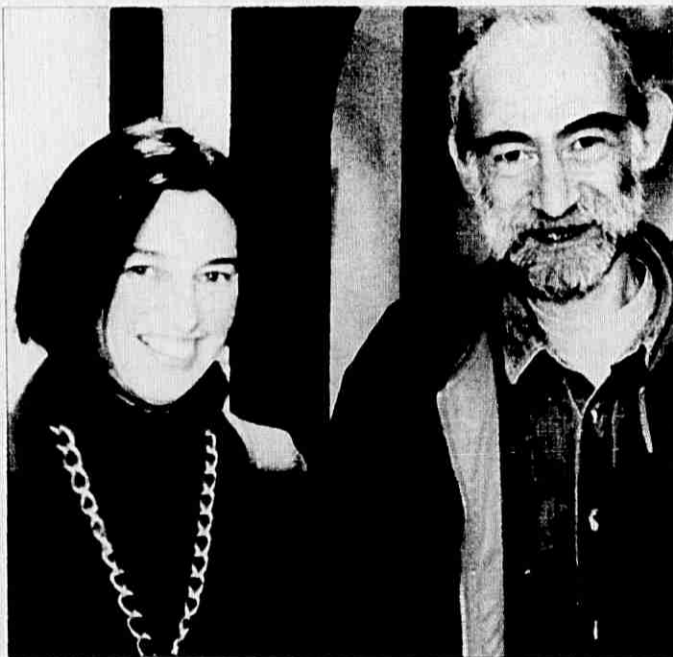

Lemon Grass Is Tangy And Cool

LEMONGRASS is a cool, tangy-smelling herb, used for all sorts of purposes – but it looks nice in the garden too.

In a bath, lemongrass oil will relax the mind and clear the head. It has been used for centuries to combat depression and bad moods. It will cleanse and refresh tired, sweaty skin, and its antiseptic qualities will prevent infections. Astringent and toning, lemongrass oil, when added to a facial steamer, tightens, refines and firms a sluggish, oily skin.

As a spritzer, it is an excellent cleansing deodorant, used on the face and body. Lemongrass also has medicinal qualities. It fights airborne bacteria when used in a vaporiser for relief of cold and flu symptoms.

Until recently lemongrass, or takrai as it is known in Thailand, was grown mainly in India, Indonesia and South East Asia. But as the popularity of Thai cuisine grows around the world, the demand for it has increased.

Lemongrass has an intriguing, lemony perfume without

the bite that lemons can add to food. The taste is refreshing and light, with a hint of ginger. It is most often used in curries, marinades, stews, and seafood soups as it needs liquids to bring out its essential oils. Its citrus taste helps to lighten some of the richer tasting dishes. Lemongrass is also used as the basis of a popular drink in the Tropics, and as a tea.

The best way to grow lemongrass is to start with a stalk you have bought from a market or shop.

The freshest stalks can usually be found in Asian markets or health food markets. Be sure to buy ones that have plump bases and long, blade-like green leaves – these will be the freshest ones.

Place the root end in water with a bit of plant food and wait until the roots develop. Plant in an area that gets full sun but is protected from the wind. Being a native of the Tropics, lemongrass prefers a sandy soil and plenty of moisture.

It is a member of the grass family (Gramineae) and is considered a tender perennial. Outside the Tropics it is

treated as an annual, since it is sensitive to frost. It grows well in pots (they prefer a lot of room). This way, you can transfer the pots to a greenhouse over the winter in colder areas.

Like most grasses, lemongrass is a quick grower, getting up to six feet tall under ideal conditions. Outside the Tropics it will grow to about three feet. It will even grow indoors with sufficient light and heat.

Lemongrass, with its delicate, long green leaves and ivory bases, adds an attractive contrast to the other plants in a herb garden.

Its summertime flowers are green clusters tinged with red on the end of a curving stalk. But these are only seen in ideal conditions.

As the lemongrass grows, it sends out new stalks from the central base. Once these are about two and a half inches long and three-quarters of an inch wide at the base, they are ready to use. To harvest from your plant, just cut off the stalks you need leaving the rest to continue to grow – a bit of the Tropics in your own back garden.

This week in the Garden

COVER ALPINES WITH GLASS

Some alpine plants suffer in the winter months because of the excess water in the air. The water works its way into the leaves and makes them rot. To protect from rain, keep them covered by sheets of glass kept aloft with sticks or bent wire. Leave the sides of the shelter open as air circulation is essential.

DIG UP EARLY CHRYSANTHEMUMS

Border chrysanthemums are quite hardy during the winter, but they can rot and die. To avoid losing your collection take a couple of examples of each variety and pack them in a box with a little light soil. Cut off the stems five to eight cm above soil level and leave them in a greenhouse.

FINISH PLANTING TULIPS AND HYACINTHS

There is still time to plant your hyacinths and tulips. You will have to hurry though, because they should have been planted in the last week of October.

FORCE INDIAN AZALEAS

To get really early flowers on your Indian azaleas, bring them into a slightly warmer environment. An average of 18 to 21°C will do. Spray them every morning with lukewarm water. Other early flowering shrubs such as forsythias, ornamental cherries and even lilac can be brought into a greenhouse as long as the temperature gets no higher than 16°C.

Call For Action On Planters In Tallow

Dear Sir,

As Christmas approaches TUCA (Tallow Urban Concern Association) and Tallow Traders Association have renewed their call on Waterford County Council to remove the concrete structures (planters) and end right angle parking in the town.

In a statement signed by TUCA Chairman, William J. Fitzgerald, the two groups refer to the past six years as difficult ones for the West Waterford town. It claims that many shoppers have been deterred from coming to Tallow because of parking difficulties created by the planters and right angle parking, describing it as "dangerous and time consuming".

TUCA and Tallow Traders Association say the removal of the planters and the reintroduction of diagonal parking has been made more urgent by the closure of the two factories in the town - Cadena and Flair. New industries will be put off investing in Tallow due to the problems outlined, they claim.

Both groups are also asking for the introduction of two pedestrian crossings, to slow down traffic and make Tallow safer for all, especially the children.

In conclusion TUCA and Tallow Traders Association remind the Council that it is the will of the people that the changes be attended to immediately, as indicated by the petition signed by at least 90% of the people of Tallow.

Mr. Fitzgerald reminds the Council of the views and advice of a friend of his well versed in legal matters; "Keep up the good work for Tallow."

If those concrete structures were removed and diagonal parking restored, Tallow would, within a year, become a boom town. Why can't Waterford County Council take on board the views of the people of Tallow and surrounding areas, whose elected representatives they are?"

On arrival in Ballysaggart, his coffin draped in the clubs colours was shouldered by various clubs in the community. His remains were received by Fr. K. Mulcahy P.P.

Requiem Mass was offered on Wednesday afternoon for the happy repose of his soul. Chief celebrant was Fr. K. Mulcahy P.P., assisted by Canon Nugent. Dear Friends:
"Today, we gather to lay to rest a true friend and neighbour, Jimmy Greehy. His love for Ballysaggart and its people, young and old will never be forgotten. He was always ready and willing to help out any neighbour in need.

If one was going away for a day or a week all they had to do was let him know and they could rest assured that everything was O.K. when they came back. It was not unusual, especially in Spring time when cows were calving and sheep lambing to see him with his flash lamp in a farmers yard giving a helping hand to an animal in distress. He was one of the old stock, even though a young man who helped to keep animals alive until the vet came. There was one of those men in most parishes in by-gone days.

He was the first Chairman of the local hurling club when it was revived in 1954 after almost 100 years. He was also Secretary to the committee who wrote the history of Ballysaggart and Chairman of the Community Alert Group.

He was a very honest, religious man who never passed the church without visiting the cemetery and praying for those buried there. He was often seen walking around the graveyard with his cap under his arm praying for those who had no one to pray for them. May you rest in peace Jimmy and may the sod of your beloved Ballysaggart rest lightly on your soul old friend".

FARMING LEADER

IFA SAYS CATTLE PRICES ARE A DISASTER ZONE

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman Tom Leahy has said recently that cattle prices are hardening slightly as under 30 month animals become ever scarcer. "Up to 87p/lb that has been paid for R & O grade steers and heifers under 30 months of age."

Mr Leahy said most of the factories are quoting 82/84p/lb or 83/85p/lb but were actually having to pay 85/87p/lb to get supplies of under 30 months steers and heifers.

On over 30 month cattle, Mr Leahy said best prices of 79/80p/lb were being paid in the northern half of the country. He said most factories were quoting 74/76p/lb for O & R grades but were having to pay 79/80p/lb for top quality.

Mr Leahy said farmers were taking a roasting on over 30 months cattle with losses of £100 to £130 per head at prices of 74/75p/lb. He said this low level of price is a full 15p/lb below the 90p/lb needed to be viable and producers are losing an average of £115 per head on their cattle.

The Waterford IFA livestock leader said the silence of the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh on the cattle price issue

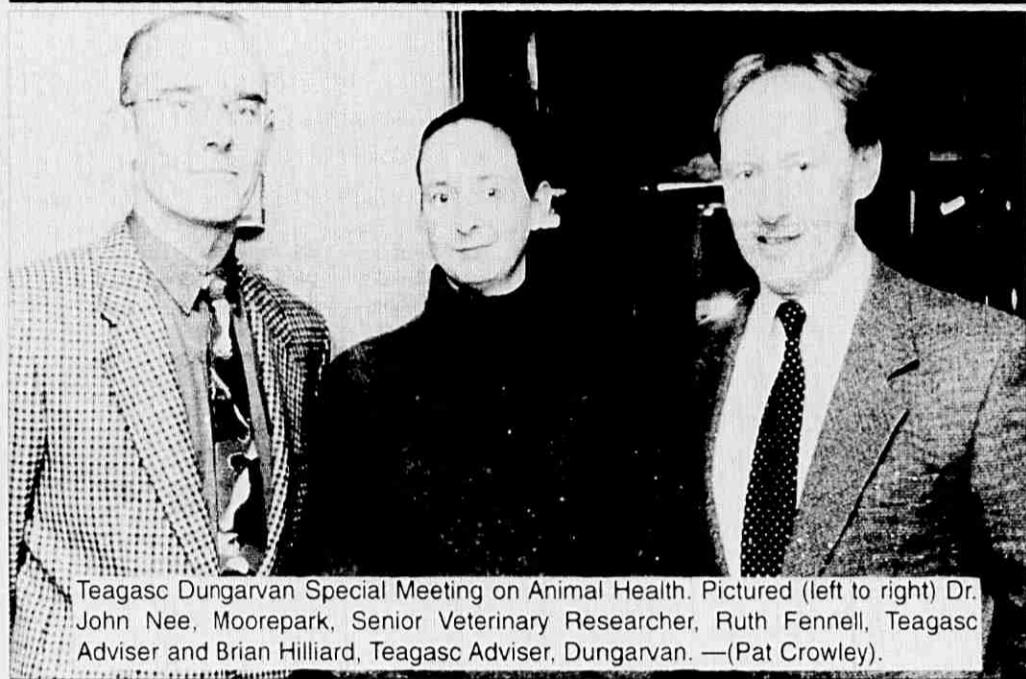
was deafening. "Despite repeated promises on reopening markets, particularly Egypt and promised on intervention, cattle prices have been a disaster zone for the Minister this autumn."

Mr Leahy said the Beef Management Committee on Friday, November 16th agreed to purchase 5,970t of cow beef into

the Special Purchase Scheme at 184.4/kg which is equivalent to an O grade price of 62p/lb, an R grade price of 66p/lb and a 56p/lb for P grades. Mr Leahy said this tender will require at least 22,000 cows over the next 2 weeks.

The Waterford IFA livestock leader contrasted the cattle price situation in Great Britain

our largest export market with Irish prices. He said steers are making 160p/lb Str. the equivalent of 97p/lb IR. In Scotland steers and heifers are making an average of 179p/kg Str. equivalent to 109p/lb Ir. Mr Leahy said this is a full 24p/lb above our under 30 month price or a staggering £180 per animal.

South East ICMSA News

ANNOUNCEMENT ON 7M GALLONS ALLOCATION WELCOMED

The announcement by the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Rural Development that the 7M gallons of remaining free quota under the Agenda 2000 Agreement will be allocated to farmers who experienced diffi-

culties in the early - mid 1980's, in particular Development Plan Farmers, has been welcomed by ICMSA.

Mr. Jackie Cahill, Deputy President and Chairperson of ICMSA's Dairy Committee said: "The announcement is in line with the agreement between ICMSA and the Milk

Rights Group. I am pleased that the Minister has agreed to implement the principal components of this agreement".

However, ICMSA is concerned that the Minister has put in a number of criteria that are likely to exclude some genuine cases. "ICMSA intend to study the implications of these criteria and, if necessary, will be seeking a number of changes so that all farmers are treated fairly and that their efforts over the years to develop their farm business is recognised", concluded Mr. Cahill.

PRESENT SYSTEM HAS SERVED FARMERS WELL

"The present system where Dairy Co-ops are involved in supplying, specifying and monitoring the use of intramammary products is working extremely well and should be retained", said Mr. Jackie Cahill, Chairperson of the ICMSA Dairy Committee speaking following a meeting with Department of Agriculture, Food & Rural Development Officials.

Mr. Cahill said: "The key issues are the safe use of intramammary products, animal welfare and price competition. All of these aspects are each and collectively being achieved under the present regime. The recent report of the Medicines Board on this issue supports this view".

"It must not be forgotten that the industry currently has a comprehensive residue testing

regime for animal products with a severe penalty structure. The Irish dairy industry involving Vets and researchers have a comprehensive, on-going programme with regard to mastitis control," concluded Mr. Cahill.

MINISTER'S POSITION ON SHEEPMEAT REFORM DISCUSSIONS WELCOMED

"ICMSA welcomes the decision of the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Rural Development to vote against the final compromise and to hold out for a better deal for Irish Sheep farmers", said Mr. T.J. Nally, Chairperson of ICMSA's Sheep Committee speaking following the failure of the EU Council of Agriculture Ministers to reach agreement on the reform of the sheepmeat regime.

"Irish sheep farmers now need a positive result when the negotiations resume in December so they can plan with confidence for the future. This reform represents the opportunity to put in place a proper policy for sheep farmers and to provide a stable base for the Irish sheep sector. Ireland must not let this opportunity slip," concluded Mr. Nally.

DAIRYING

Record Attendance at National Dairy Conference

One thousand three hundred people attended the Teagasc National Dairy Conference in Killarney last week. Dr. Denis Brosnan M. D. of Kerry Agribusiness spoke for the last time at a public seminar before stepping down from his present position. Mr Brosnan spoke of his vision of the future of Dairying to 2010.

1. "Many central and eastern European countries will be part of the E.U.
2. The various rounds of negotiations at WTO will bring more liberalised trade in dairy and agricultural products.
3. South America will become an export continent for dairy products as well as China and India and these exports can find their way on to the world market unsubsidised.
4. Fonterra (New Zealand Dairy Company) will continue to increase its milk output at home and will be a major dairy force on world markets from this and from its joint ventures abroad.
5. Increased buying power of the multiples will bring about larger global food companies.

We will have fewer farmers on the land. The EU will find it more difficult to subsidise exports with its commitments to WTO policy so milk output will still be governed by some farm of a quota regime and prices internally within the EU will remain relatively high. Milk price is likely to fall so individual farmers will need a larger quota and be more efficient or else they will have to look for greater direct EU support for the enterprise of farming"

Dr. Brosnan also stated that a large number of co-ops loosely aligned to a central marketing organisation as we have in Ireland will never be able to compete with the large dairy forces which are emerging globally. He feels that a catalyst is needed to bring about change and speculated that the present fall in milk prices may provide that stimulus.

He feels that there are only two routes to follow:

1. Merge our dairy processing and marketing activities and get the benefits of scale, size and market knowledge.
2. Expand beyond milk and become a broad based food organisation.

SUCKLER COWS

Feed Requirements of the Dry Suckler Cow

Survey data a few years ago showed that half the suckler cows calved in March and April and up to three quarters calved in the four months between February and May. Therefore, apart from a few late calvers, these cows are now dry.

TARGET CONDITION SCORES

The best guideline for feeding dry suckler cows is to feed to target condition scores. For spring calving cows, the two critical condition scores is 2.5 at calving and slightly over 2.0 at mating, but rising rather than falling. It is an advantage to have early spring calvers in higher condition, i.e., a score of 3.0 to 3.5, to allow for the use of higher body reserves for milk production before they go to grass. Winter feeding should be adjusted to reach the condition score at calving outlined above. Cows in good body condition (score 3.0 or better) at the start of the winter, can be allowed to lose about 0.5 of a condition score, which is the equivalent of 35 to 40kg. of body weight. Cows in low body condition 2.0 or less should be fed to gain at least 0.5 of a condition score or 35-40kg. body weight in addition to the weight gain associated with pregnancy (calf and associated tissues and fluids).

THIN COWS

No matter how careful the management, there will always be a range in condition scores within a herd. First calvers, older cows and the best milkers are likely to be thinner than the rest. It is good practice to separate the herd where possible (its easy in a slatted house) and feed thin cows at a higher level. These should be fed silage to appetite. If silage quality is poor they may need 1.0 to 1.5kg. meal per day in the final six weeks of pregnancy. First calvers should also get 1.5kg. meal (daily between calving) and the start of grazing.

FEEDING STRAW TO DRY COWS

Good quality straw can form about 2/3 of the diet for mature dry suckler cows in good condition. Good straw fed to appetite, supplemented with about 2.5kg. of 16% crude protein ration is an adequate diet for such cows. Feed about 100 grams per day of high Phosphorus mineral/vitamin mineral supplement with straw-based diets.

IFA CALL ON DEPT. OF AGRICULTURE TO PAY ALL COMPENSATION DUE IN DISADVANTAGED AREAS

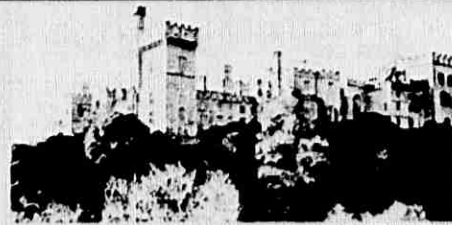
Waterford IFA Western Committee Chairman Anthony Ryan has criticised the Department of Agriculture for failing to compensate some farmers who lose out at the agreed 90% rate under the new area based Disadvantaged Areas system.

Mr. Ryan said that the Department of Agriculture has decided, without consultation, to only partly compensate those farmers whose land areas may have reduced in their 2001 area aid application from their 2000 area aid application. A number of farmers have contacted IFA who had reduced their land area mainly due to rented land not being available in 2001, and whose compensation is reduced significantly as a result.

The Waterford IFA Western leader said farmers who lose out under the new system were promised 90% compensation in 2001 based on the difference of the new system compared to the average headage payout in 1998, 1999 and 2000.

IFA is now calling on the Department to reverse this unfair decision and to pay farmers the compensation that they were promised.

Lismore Tidy Towns

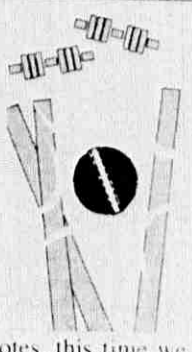

LOCAL HISTORY

Last week we wrote about the great Desmond Rebellion in Munster which collapsed in 1583. In the beginning of that year, pardons were offered to most rebels who surrendered to encourage as many as possible to lay down arms. On the 7th February, 1583 some Dungarvan men on rebellion were pardoned. Dungarvan had been a Desmond town for centuries and these men were doing their feudal duty but it was time to surrender. The policy of pardoning rebels made the task of the conquerors easier.

Richard Fitzgerald of Knockmaon was not so fortunate. He lost all his property and it was granted to Sir Christopher Hatton, Lord Chancellor of England 18th June, 1589. Hatton received the Castle of Knockmaon and some lands also belonging to the O'Brien's of Comeragh and the deceased Earl of Desmond. The conditions of the grant were that he should pay rent to the crown and then settle people on the land.

Sir James Fitzgerald of Dromana, brother of and successor of Garret, Viscount Decies had remained loyal to the government so he kept his lands. Among the planters who came from England was Sir Walter Raleigh who received Lismore and the area around as far south as Youghal but he was also granted the Desmond properties in Dungarvan. The towerhouse in Abbeyside still remained McGrath property. Although many of the family had been in rebellion, the head of the family had remained loyal and he kept his property.

HOW TO BUDGET

If you would like to get your finances in order but do not know how to start, the following guidelines may help you:

Take all your monthly bills and organise them into categories, i.e. mortgage, rent, groceries, petrol, car, stationery, meals out/entertainment, hardware etc.

Using your nett pay as the guideline, subtract all the expenses that you have noted. This figure should tell you very quickly if you are spending more than you earn or if you have a surplus. If you have a surplus on paper but in reality never have anything left, be aware that this funny money can be a large drain on your resources. If you want to track it, try writing down everything (yes, even that magazine or bar or chocolate) that you pay for by cash for a week or so, it will probably open your eyes!

If your mortgage or rent is very high and leaves you with little left over for everyday living expenses, could you move to a more affordable home? If you are unable to do this, maybe a few extra hours work or some overtime would pay?

Could you cut back on your weekly grocery bill? Prepared food is very expensive. If you cannot cook there are some very good cookery books available at reasonable prices. Start off with something very simple and be more adventurous as you get more confident. It is healthier and much more economical and you might surprise yourself and enjoy it. You may be happy that your grocery bill is small, but take a look at your eating out costs before you congratulate yourself. Eating out even at a fast food outlet is expensive on a regular basis.

Is your wardrobe bursting with clothes that

you never wear, yet you find that you can't resist those bargains in the sale? Clear out all those things that you have not worn in the past year and drop them off at your local charity shop. Part of stretching the clothes budget involves learning to mix and match. It is not a good use of money to have many items of clothing that can only be worn with one outfit. Decide how much you will spend on clothes for the next year, (be realistic), and stick to that decision. When making out your budget for clothes don't forget those special occasions i.e. Communion, Wedding etc and factor in a figure for them.

Cars are a large drain on even the most well paid persons resources. Add up your car maintenance, insurance, depreciation and petrol costs. It can come to a very large amount. Your car does not have to be the latest model or brand new, try to limit your outgoings in this area by buying a realistic size car that suits your budget.

Last but by no means least always ask yourself "Do I really need this/ could I buy a less expensive item? After you have got into the habit of budgeting, you may be surprised that your new lifestyle is not so bad. You may not have as much money as you previously thought you had, but you know if you have budgeted properly, you really do have that money you are spending.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION: I was recently awarded a reduced Old Age (Contributory) Pension as I only have a yearly average of 17 social insurance contributions. I was also awarded a reduced Qualified Adult Allowance (QAA) even though my wife has no income. My neighbour continues to get a full QAA even though he is also receiving a reduced pension. Why am I treated differently?

ANSWER: Since 6th April, 2001 new claimants with 19 or less yearly average contributions will only receive a reduced payment for their spouse. Those who were awarded their reduced pension before then will continue to receive the full QAA as long as their spouse is under 66 years of age.

Council Must Practice What It Preaches Says Cllr.

Cllr. Teresa Wright stated that with the introduction of better local government Dungarvan Urban Council is "sadly lagging behind in transparency and accountability when it has now decided to sell land owned by the council privately."

This land, according to Cllr. Wright, should have been put on the open market.

"This council cannot be seen to conduct its business behind closed doors", she said.

The Chairperson of the Urban Council, also slammed the County Manager Donal Connolly for what she claimed was the way he proceeded to get unanimous agreement from councillors prior to the meeting.

The issue arose over the selling of Urban Council land to Don Mulcahy for £65,000. The land was initially owned by a Mrs. Morrissey who sold it to the Council for £500 in what Cllr. Wright described as "a long protracted sale".

The land was rezoned during the drawing up of the last development plan and Don Mulcahy approached and offered the market price, according to the County Manager.

Cllr. Billy Kyne described the sale as "transparent and fair" and said there was nothing uncompetitive about it.

Cllr. Lar Hart told the council that he did not see that anyone else would pay more

than £65,000 for a half acre which he said would not receive planning permission.

While the sale of land was proposed and seconded an amendment was put forward by Cllr Wright stating that the sale should go on the open market. This was seconded by Cllr. Paddy Power.

This led to a vote with the sale to Mulcahy's carried by five votes to two.

Geal Gua Estates Problems Still Not Resolved

The problems with unfinished work left by the developer continue to resurface and this time were brought to the fore by Cllr. John Deasy who said it was with "a sense of frustration and deep disappointment that I bring this up."

The residents of Geal Gua had already approached the council and formed a deputation telling members of the

council all the problems which faced the estate.

The council was at that time taking legal action against the developer who left a long list of work unfinished.

The Urban Council also gave the residents an undertaking to carry out the work themselves if the developer failed to do it himself before the end of August.

However, the work was not completed by the developer and as yet the Council has not started to fix some of the estates list of problems either.

Cllr. Deasy said because of this "the residents feel left down and they feel that the council has failed them".

Now Cllr. Deasy believes that "everything we say sounds hallo if we can't even live up to our undertaking".

Problems could be prevented in future developments, Cllr. Billy Kyne said, "by getting it right first time and any problems should be addressed first time."

County Manager Donal Connolly said that "when we give an undertaking we will do everything we can to fix it."

Forthnightly Collections & Wheelie Bins On The Way For Recycling

Due to the break over Christmas in collecting recyclables Cllr. Michael O'Riordan has called for loads to be collected twice during December.

Because of the break, Cllr. O'Riordan said, and the fact that the recyclables have to be kept in plastic bags, that this could mean people would have bags of rubbish mounting up around the house.

In reply the County Manager Donal Connolly said the council would be moving towards a fortnightly collection in the New Year and they are also looking into the possibility of using wheelie bins for collections.

However, he did say that the cost of providing wheelie bins has been put at £230,000 although this figure includes the county and urban areas, Mr. Connolly said that at present this cost would be prohibitive.

Lights Out On Busy Road

The road lighting on one side of the road from the Spring Roundabout to John Foley's Service Station has been out for the last five weeks, Cllr. Lar Hart said.

The Labour Councillor said he presumed that the matter had been passed on to the ESB after he raised it on that particular occasion.

However, he said, that the ESB was clearly ignoring the situation and described their inaction as a "disgrace". He also asked the County Manager Donal Connolly to invite the ESB to a meeting so they could discuss the situation and the length of time it has

taken them to fix certain problems.

Town Engineer Joe Brennan said the ESB had initially repaired the problem when it first occurred. However, he said, they went out again and the ESB said they are in the process of fixing them again.

Mr. Brennan told the councillors that the road is a very busy one and while the situation wasn't ideal there was enough lighting from the lights still operating to prevent problems from occurring.

Extension Of Footpath At Pedestrian Crossing Causes Driving Test Failure - Claim

A person failed their driving test on account of the extension to the footpath at the corner of the Bank of Ireland Cllr. Nuala Ryan claimed during the course of her call for the extension to be looked at.

The Town Engineer Joe Brennan told the members of the council that the extension was put in place as a warning for drivers that a person was about to cross the road. By putting this in place Mr. Brennan said, drivers could see pedestrians clearly and would be able to slow down in time to let people pass safely across.

However, Mr. Brennan said part of the footpath extension had since been removed and the driving test incident wasn't a clear cut case. But he would look at what else could possibly be done to remedy any problems being experienced.

No Development Made On Footpath To Crystal Factory

Cllr. Lar Hart asked what progress had been made on the provision of a footpath from the Spring Roundabout to Dungarvan Crystal.

The Town Engineer replied that there have been no developments made on this scheme as of yet. However, the council are hopeful that they can remove the small margin of grass outside the entrance of the Crystal factory and they hope to put in double yellow lining there.

This it is hoped will give traffic coming out of the crystal factory more room to leave and give traffic passing the entrance a warning that it is there.

Earl of Waterford (died 1453) - Sir John Talbot

He was Lord Justice of Ireland in 1412 and Lord-Lieutenant between 1414-1421. He fought under Henry VI in many campaigns in France. During one of his campaigns he was captured by Joan of Arc, but was later released.

As rewards for his endeavours the King appointed him Earl of Shrewsbury in 1442 and Earl of Waterford in 1446. He served as Ambassador to France in 1443 and as Lieutenant of the Duchy of Aquitaine in 1453. Talbot died at the Battle of Chastillon (last battle of the 100 years war) in 1453.

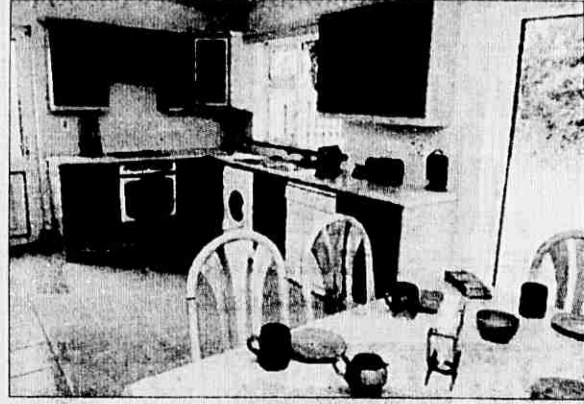

West Waterford Bord Na nOg Holds Annual Convention

The first of the divisional conventions for the year took place in Lawlors Hotel in Dungarvan on Monday November 19, when West Waterford Bord na n-Og held its convention before a sizeable attendance. 13 of the 17 clubs in the division were present with apologies from two of the missing clubs. Also present were some invited guests. Some other invited guests were unable to attend and passed on their apologies.

OPENING

The outgoing Chairman Eddie O'Shea opened the meeting by thanking the club delegates for their attendance and also welcomed some specially invited guests. The chairman said that a number of other invited guests were unable to attend. Amongst those unable to attend were Anthony Walsh (Secretary of Western Adult Bord), Pat Grant (County Youth Officer), Tony Morrissey (County Adult Treasurer), John O'Leary (County Development Officer) and Catherine Power (W.L.R.). The outgoing Chairman wished both Tony Morrissey and Pat Grant a full and speedy recovery to full fitness.

FINANCE

Long serving Treasurer, Jimmy McCarthy, showed the Bord to be in a very secure position and remarked that in his time on the Bord he could not remember the Bord to be in such a healthy position. He pointed out that, off the top of his head that he could not remember the Bord being in such a position. He thanked those that help collect at the gates during the year. He made a special mention to Kilrossanty Club man Jim Power who collected on a number of occasions at the Leamybrien venue for the Bord.

Three clubs have yet to pay their referees bill and bill for running tournaments. These clubs are asked to have their bill played by the weekend.

The treasurer pointed out that there was a number of clubs who did not have bills paid and asked that they do so as quickly as possible.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

A full review of the year was given in the Secretary's report. All championship winners were congratulated and the various sponsors were thanked. Clubs that gave their grounds so freely throughout the year were also thanked. Tommy Drummy who gives the Bord tremendous support throughout the year was also thanked. The editor of the Dungarvan Leader was thanked for allowing space in his newspaper for the coverage of underage hurling and football. John Jackson was thanked for including the results of finals played when submitting results to the national newspapers and Catherine Power in W.L.R. was thanked for her help in getting games mentioned in the sports news.

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

In his chairman's address Eddie O'Shea thanked all who helped during the year, his fellow Bord Members, the clubs, the referees, the Fraher Field Committee and much more.

The Chairman pointed out that over the past few years the Bord had become very lenient with clubs and that clubs were now starting to take advantage of that leniency. Clubs were told that from 2002, no breach of rules would be accepted and if there was that clubs would be dealt with very severely.

Clubs were informed that late taking to the field would no longer be tolerated, either would the calling off of matches between clubs or the not handing in of team sheets to the referee.

Delegates were warned that any club fielding an illegal player in any game in the future will also be dealt with. Clubs that have grievances with any member of the Bord that go to the papers first without first speaking to the Bord to try and solve whatever problems there may be will also be dealt with.

An appeal for every club to supply a referee was also made. The chairman pointed out that without clubs like Kilrossanty who supply a number of referees for Bord na n-Og games, games could not go ahead. The chairman said that if there was going to be a shortage of referees this coming year, that clubs who fail to provide a referee will find that no referee may turn up when these clubs meet.

The abuse of referees was also mentioned and is something that will not be tolerated from now on. The chairman said that just as no club selectors go out to harm his teams chances of winning, no referee goes out to harm any team. He pointed out that sometimes referees do make mistakes because of the pressure that they are put under, but it should be accepted as that, a mistake.

Clubs were informed that courses can be arranged for those who may wish to become referees.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The election of officers saw Eddie O'Shea returned as Chairman, Paddy Foley as vice chairman, Thomas Keane as secretary, Jimmy McCarthy as Treasurer and Seamus O'Brien as registrar. Patricia O'Brien who had been nominated for the position of assistant secretary had informed the Bord before the meeting that she would be not seeking election. As no other nominations were before the Bord, nominations were sought from the floor. Brid-

get Mernin of the St. Oliver's club was proposed by Paddy O'Grady of the Nire and seconded by Pat Prendergast of Kilrossanty for the position. As no other nominations were forthcoming and Bridget had allowed her name to go forward, she was declared elected. For the position of assistant Treasurer, outgoing Assistant Treasurer Paddy O'Grady was nominated by Seamus O'Brien and seconded by Paddy Walsh (Fourmilewater). No other names were forwarded so Paddy was elected.

MOTION

The only motion on the agenda was from Ballyduff. This motion asked that all division three games are played at 13 a side. A similar motion from the same club was before convention some years back and was passed. However in recent times clubs were agreeing to play 15 a side amongst themselves.

At last years county convention a similar motion was passed, however at that time it was agreed that if clubs in the league section of the competition agreed to play 15 a side they could but when it came to the knockout part of the championship, clubs would have to play 13 a side.

Clubs present at this year's western Convention were told however that as and from 2002 all Division three would be 13 a side, and that they were not allowed to play 15 a side. It was pointed out that if they were playing 15 a side in the league section of a competition it would be unfair to the two players who were playing all the year to have to be dropped for a semi final and final if his club were to advance that far.

MEDALS

Medals were presented to the following clubs for winning Championships during the year. Abbeyside/Ballinacourty for under 16 hurling, under 14 football and Under 12 football, Clashmore for under 16 football, under 14 football, under 12 hurling and under 11 hurling, Briceys for under 16 hurling and under 12 football, Dungarvan for under 16 football, under 12 hurling and under 11 hurling, Naomh Brid for under 16 hurling, St. Oliver for under 16 football, Lismore for under 14 hurling, under 12 football and for the Thomas Scanlon Cup, Cappoquin/Affane for under 14 hurling, under 14 football, and under 13 hurling, Stradbally in under 14 and 12 hurling, Fourmilewater for under 11 hurling and An Gaeltacht for under 13 hurling.

INVITED GUESTS

The first invited guest to speak was County Adult Chairman Paddy Joe Ryan. The County Chairman thanked Bord na n-Og for putting the original date for Convention back three days in order that the monthly meeting of Adult County Board could be held ahead of the Special Congress to deal with rule 21, and thanked the Bord for the invitation to Convention. He said that he had attended a number of Western and County games during the year and found that there was a very good standard of play amongst the youth of the region. The Chairman pointed out that he was delighted that the meeting of the Bord's arranged last January was of tremendous help to all Bords and said that a similar meeting would take place this year.

Chairman of Western Adult Board addressed the meeting and he thanked the Bord for the invitation. He told the meeting that for as long as he was Chairman of Adult Board and hopefully for much longer that there would be a very good understanding between all Bords and that fixture clashes that happened in the past were a thing of the past.

Chairman of County Bord na n-Og Seamus Quirke was also present. He pointed out the importance of coaching and to get someone to work with the children in the schools. He pointed out that teachers nowadays have a lot to cope with and may not have the time to coach hurling and football. He said every parish would have a person who would have played the games or have a very keen interest in the games who would be willing to go into the schools. He suggested maybe a retired person with time on their hands would be the ideal person.

REGISTRATION

Divisional and County Registrar Seamus O'Brien pointed out the importance of registering players properly. He pointed out that nowadays players would only have to be registered once. Delegates were told that in the new year all clubs would be given a list of there registered players and that they should update this list.

TOURNAMENTS

It was pointed out that a number of clubs are holding Tournaments throughout the year without prior permission of the Bord. These Tournaments are illegal and if a player was to get seriously injured there would be no insurance to cover him.

Clubs were told that for all underage outdoor tournaments they must get prior permission from the Bord. Clubs were told that they have to write to the Bord informing the Bord of what teams were taking part and to pay £10. Clubs were also told that if they were getting in clubs from the other five Munster Counties, they would have to get permission from Munster Council, and if teams from outside Munster were being brought in permission

would have to be got from Croke Park.

ADULT CHAMPIONSHIPS

Clubs were told that juvenile players would not be allowed to play in Adult Championships. This is something that has been brought up before at adult county meetings. All juvenile clubs will be forwarded this ruling.

RUGBY

Billy O'Halloran (Clashmore) pointed out that because of the shortage of FAS G.A.A. coaches working in the National Schools, coaches in other codes are now taking advantage of this, and were now moving into the schools to take over the P.E. classes.

It was pointed out that in the Clashmore area a coach from the Youghal Rugby Club was visiting the schools. John Kiely of the Colligan/Kilgobinet Club said it was disappointing that this was happening as there was some very good Coaches visiting the schools and the work that they were doing was clear to be seen in the high standard of Football played in the recent school league finals.

DEVELOPMENT SQUADS

Pat Prendergast (Kilrossanty) spoke about the Development Squads. He asked that those involved with the various squads get in contact with the referees, as they see the most games during the year and can see the players that would benefit most by being involved. He also asked why a very good 13 year old may not be invited to take part with the under 14 squad. John O'Brien pointed out that the development squad was there to keep players on the age together and that the good 13 year old would get his chance the following year with the under 14's.

TIMING OF CHAMPIONSHIPS

Michael Tobin (An Gaeltacht) asked the Bord to look more carefully next year at the timing of the championships. He pointed out that this year that his club did not play any under 16 game from the time they were beaten in the county semi final in August till they played the Western Final in mid October. He did however say that this was possibly because that 2 clubs withdrew from the championship which meant the competition was rather meaningless.

Pat Prendergast said in under 14 football it was not right that the competition was finishing at the time it was finishing over the past few years.

DELEGATE MEETING

Clubs were told that the Bord would be making out provisional grading's shortly and that when done they would be posted to the clubs. At the time of posting out these grading's clubs would be given a date for a Delegate meeting.

The meeting would deal with the usual matters such as affiliation, gradings, registration, transfers etc. Clubs were asked to be honest at this meeting and not ask to come down a grade because they wanted to win a soft title. Clubs that found they may be in a grade too high should at the meeting produce a list of players in the age group they feel that they are placed too high in, and it would be looked at.

TRANSFERS

Clubs are reminded that at a meeting last year it was agreed that as and from this year any player wanting to transfer from one club to another, must have the transfer papers with the divisional secretary one week before the first delegate meeting of the year. Clubs are reminded that only club secretaries are allowed to ask for these papers and that no photocopies of transfer papers will be accepted.

RULE BOOKS

Central Council Representative Seamus O'Brien has at the moment a number of rule books and will be ordering some more. These rule books are very important and are a must for every club.

Clubs wanting to avail of these books can do so by contacting Seamus. The books cost £5.

MINOR FOOTBALL TRIALS

Trials for next years Minor Football team will take place this Sunday morning at St. Augustine's College. Any player who is interested in playing Minor Football for Waterford in 2002 is asked to be at the ground in good time for the trials which will begin at 10.00 am. Further trials will take place on December 9 and 16.

This year Waterford will be assured of at least five games in the Munster Minor Football Championship. The six Munster Counties will compete against each other in a round robin league with the top four teams advancing to the semi finals. The first game of the campaign will be in early March.

Strengthened by the recruitment of former Tipperary player, Andy Moloney, who scored two goals against his compatriots, and with established county stars such as Stephen Frampton, Fergal Hartley and Paul Flynn, they are confident of finally annexing a coveted Munster title.

Certainly, no-one will be able to say it was undeserved should they achieve their goal. Having defeated Clare and Tipperary opposition, they are now confronted by the kingpins of Cork.

Blackrock have a huge tradition in this competition. While the 'Gunners are chas-

ing a first crown, the 'Rockies are aiming for their fifth. When Cork clubs dominated the All-Ireland championship, Blackrock claimed three of their own (1972, 1974, 1979). Their captain, John Horgan, remains the only man to have lifted the Tommy Moore Cup on three occasions.

A Cork side hasn't won a Munster title since 1988, however, when Middleton defeated Cappawhite of Tipperary by a point, so the Rebel champions don't carry the same aura that they used to.

Indeed, Blackrock themselves went 14 years without success at county level before emerging from their torture in 1999. It was Ballygunner who put an end to their interest that season, in emphatic fashion, but they are a better outfit this year.

They accounted for Imokilly to garner their 31st county title before putting an end to the hopes of Kilmoyley of Kerry and Adare (Limerick).

Alan Browne seems to be producing the hurling of his life, totting up massive tallies along the way, while Wayne Sherlock proved once again that he is amongst the best defenders in the country when shackling Joe Deane in the county final. With John Browne and Fergal Ryan also playing well, Blackrock will fear no-one.

GAA Beo is presented by Micheál Ó Domhnaill, with commentary by Brian Tyers and expert analysis from Donal O'Grady, who won three Munster titles and two All-Irelands as a player with St. Finbarr's of Cork.

Motion 5 — There must be a little obscurity about this motion. It is from Tallow and they ask "That any club who handles tickets for the Munster Council should be entitled to tickets for the Munster finals, if their own county is not involved.

Motion 6 — This is from Kilrossanty and asks that all senior football clubs be entitled to participate in the Phelean Cup competition.

Motion 7 This is from Ballygunner and is worded as follows: "That the senior hurling league should form part of the championship with the top two teams in the groups going forward to the quarter finals of the championship, as was the case in previous years.

Motion 8 is from Kilrossanty and asks that the senior leagues conclude before the start of the championships.

9 & 10 — Both are from Affane/ Cappoquin: "That County and divisional Boards supply a booklet of championship fixtures to all clubs by April 21st. That no more than two week's grace be allowed on all fixtures to be played." "That serious consideration must be given to the under 21 hurling and football championships."

GROUP FOOTBALL TEAM

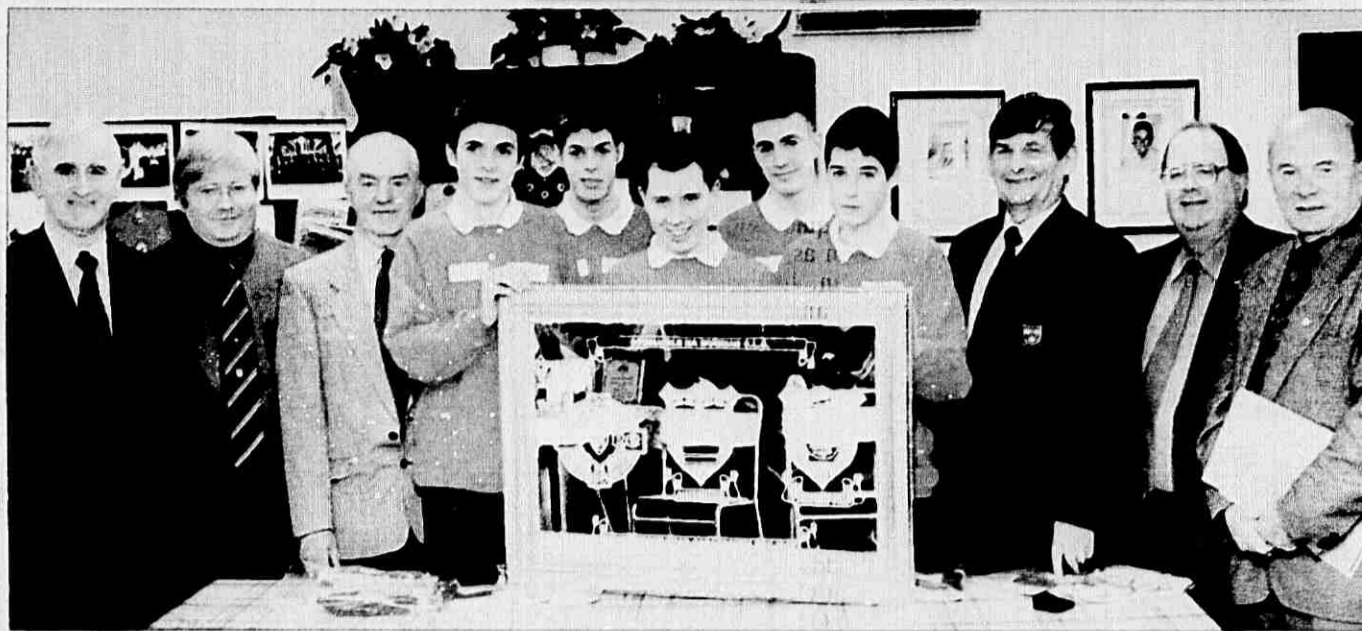

Ballygunner v. Blackrock In Munster Club Final

Thrilling Contest Anticipated At Thurles On Sunday

It will be the Waterford county champions, Ballygunner's fifth attempt to win this prestigious Munster final, they having failed on four previous occasions.

Blackrock on the other hand will be playing in their sixth provincial final and attempting to take their sixth title, having won the title on five occasions, 1971, 1973, 1978, 1979, and 1975 and hold the record in the province. They lost one final when losing to Kilruane/McDonagh's in 1985.

In their last appearance in a semi-final, Blackrock were defeated by Waterford champions, Ballygunner on a

scoreline of 0-17 to 1-11. Thousands of home supporters here will recall that thrill which saw Ballygunner go through to their fourth Munster final. They lost that one by 4-9 to 3-8. That was 2 years ago.(1999).

Before that Ballygunner had played in the 1966 and 1968 finals against the Davins and Newmarket, respectively. Their biggest disappointment in the Munster club championship was back in 1996 when losing by a single point, 4-9 to 4-8 against St. Josephs (Clare) in one of the best and most exciting finals since the inception of the competition in 1964.

Waterford have contested the finals on 12 occasions, but so far have won just one. That was in 1981 when Mount Sion defeated South Liberties, Limerick by 3-9 to 1-4. The only other Waterford club, apart from Mount Sion and Ballygunner to contest a final was Dunhill who lost to Blackrock by 0-13 to 1-8 in a thrilling game back in 1979.

Finals in any grade and in any competition are not easy to win and this will be no exception.

The Gunners have survived a very tough campaign in beating St. Josephs and Toomevara after a replay, so if fatigue or injuries are not

problems, they must stand a good chance. Also they will need to play to the form they have shown in the last two weekends. They are assured of massive Waterford support and this can be a major factor in bringing out the very best in the side.

It must not be forgotten that Blackrock are the record holders in this championship and will know what is needed to overcome the Waterford champions.

It will be a memorable final and one not to be missed by anyone who can travel. Those who cannot travel can listen to the broadcast on WLR Fm.

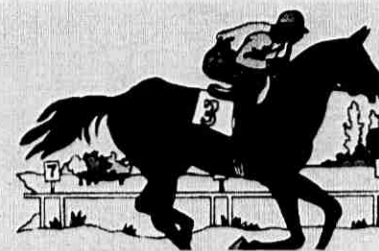
TRAINING TIPS - FLUID REPLACEMENT

Water forms approximately 75% of all protoplasm, is essential as a medium for various enzyme, chemical reactions, in addition to preventing damage to the organs by diluting the toxic wastes. So fluid replacement is of paramount importance especially during hot weather when both racing and training. Your thirst or how wet you are from sweat, are not good indicators of your bodily needs. Drink before you get thirsty, and drink little and often to be safe, especially during hot conditions. On dry windy days you could be sweating but the body may feel dry as the sweat is quickly evaporating, you'll be dehydrated before you realise it.

Electrolyte replacement drinks containing glucose and minerals are now available. Bear in mind the more concentrated the mixture in your bottle the slower the absorption rate from your stomach. Replacement of water is far more important than the replacement of electrolytes, as these can usually be put back after the race and training session by your food.

JUVENILE RACES

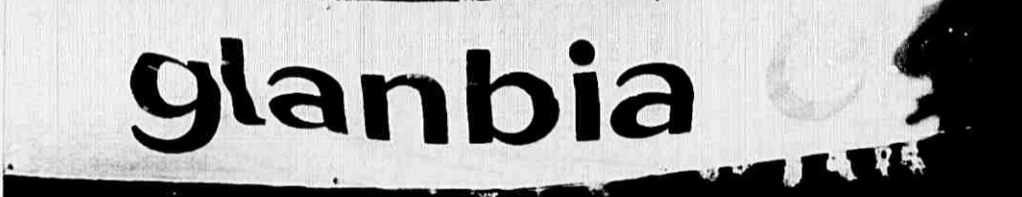

Paper Yankee Jim was pushed all the way by Belmullet Anne but responding in dashing fashion the wide running Paper Yankee Jim battled on tenaciously for his half a length win.

Owner Kathleen Stamp sent out the 4/1 winner of the tenth race over 550 yards as Glenbrien Go On (Cry Syl-Glenbrien Baby) who gave way to Savana Stinger around the opening bend came back for more over the closing bends pulling clear up the home stretch for a convincing six and a quarter lengths win over Savana Stinger in 30.58.

In a three runner eleventh contest over the standard trip the Baumen Syndicate owned and Nick Turner trained Lightning Cover (Larkhill Jp-Whitefort Sal) 1/1 poached a slender early lead over Portlaw Man before beating Tiernan Chun by a length and a half in a very respectable 29.08 the fastest return of the night.

A Punters Graveyard

The full time result from Kilcohan Park Waterford last Saturday night was the Bookmakers 10 and the Punters 0. That scoreline tells the true story on what can only be described as a dismal night for the punters as favourite after favourite fell by the wayside. 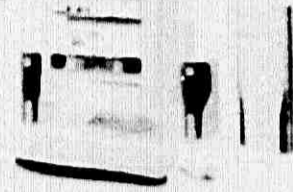
