U. S. Must Aid Israel, Nixon, Humphrey Tell B. B.

President Hubert Humphrey and former Vice-President Richard Nixon voiced strong American support of Israel, including military aid, at the triennial national convention here of B'nai B'rith.

Reiterating his position on con-tinued American military aid to Israel, the Democratic Presidential nominee said that while "arms control" was the real answer to the problem in the Middle East, Israel had a right to be strong enough to

deter aggression and defend itself, and that the U. S. "had a duty to respond favorably" to Israeli re-quests for defensive arms "on grounds of our own security inter-

The Republican Presidential candidate reiterated a statement he made in Houston to the effect that he favored the sale of U. S. military jets to Israel. Nixon said, "It would be a great threat to peace if Israel's neighbors, bent on a war and smarting from

their defeat in the Six Day war, are ever given the impression that they could launch a war with Israel and get away with it." At the same time, he noted that, "If it takes Phantom jets, they should have Phantom jets."

Tops Victnam Interest
The former Vice President maintained that the U. S. must render military support to Israel to meet the challenge of Soviet penetration into the Middle East. He termed America's interest in that region



clared that "we must make it cry-stal clear that the stake of the free world in the Middle East is great; we must impress upon the Soviets the full extent of our determination and then, and only then, will we cause them to re-examine their own policy to avoid a collision

Roundup Snares 18 Terrorists in Tel Aviv Bombing

and effective cooperation between police and Israel's security services was credited with the roundup of an Arab terrorist gang responsible for a series of explosions near the Tel Aviv Central Bus Station, which resulted in death of one man and injury to 51.

The explosions, caused by bombs placed in trash-cans near the de-pot, so angered and enraged Tel Avivians that hundreds of them attacked and beat up Arabs in the vicinity and swept into Jaffa to attack Arabs there and demolish stores and shops.

Beth El 'Breaks Ground' Indoors for New Edifice

The Joint Distribution Committee announced that it had allocated \$100,000 to provide relief for Jewish refugees arriving in Vienna from Czechoslovakia. Samuel L. Haber, JDC executive vice-chairman, revealed that, as of Sept. 4, a total of 780 refugees had applied to the JDC office in Vienna for assistance. He said the first applicants come from among the thousants. cants came from among the thousands of tourists who had been outside Czechoslovakia when Soviet troops crossed the border. The latest group, he said, consisted of men, women and children who had just come to Vienna from Czecho-

Refugees Eye U.S., Israel

Few of the Jewish refugees, Haber noted, have made any plans for the future, although small numfor the future, although small numbers indicated a desire to emigrate to the United States, Israel and other countries, "The general consensus of those on the spot," Mr. Haber said, "is that this is a waiting period, with indecisiveness playing the main role."

Israel Stunned by U.N. Failure to Condemn Egypt

JERUSALEM (JTA) — Israeli Foreign Ministry circles expressed sharp disappointment that the United Nations Security Council had failed to condemn Egypt for the cease-fire violation which resulted in death of 10 Israeli soldiers and wounding of 17, three

Reports read to the emergency session of the Security Council by Secretary General U Thant from Lt.-Gen. Odd Bull, head of the cease-fire observers, assessed blame for starting the artillery exchange the most severe since last October — on Egyptian gunners. Gen. Bull's reports also blamed Egypt for delays in accepting a cease-fire.

Israelis had expected more from the emergency session which was convened at Israel's urgent re-quest to deal with what Ambassador Yosef Tekoah described as a. "premeditated, large-scale and un-provoked assault in flagrant violation of the cease-fire." They were disappointed that the suggestion of Lord Caradon, British representative, that the Council call on both sides to observe the cease-fire, was UN

mitment to the national existence of Israel" was not determined by a bid for Jewish votes but was un-dertaken because "Americans be-lieve in the self determination of nations, because Israel is threatened by Soviet imperialism and because she has displayed guts, patriotism, idealism and a passion for freedom.

He said that, while it would be a mistake for Israel to take "for-mal and final" possession of all occupied territories, "it is not real-istic to expect Israel to surrender vital bargaining counters in the absence of a genuine peace and effective guarantees." He thought the United States "should assert some leadership in bringing about talks, first with the moderate Arab leaders and later with the militants."

He denounced the anti-Semitic propaganda emanating from Mosfollowing the Soviet-led invasion of Czechoslovakia. He said, however, that Soviet anti-Semitism was linked with Soviet designs in the Middle East.

Tactic Outrages Humphrey Humphrey said that "We should be particularly outraged by the shabbiest tactic, by the blatant appeal to anti-Semitism as justifica-tion" for the invasion of Czecho-slovakia, which he declared dramatized "the cynicism and ruthless-ness of the Soviet decision to occupy Czechoslovakia.'

Compassion for Negro

In his presidential address, Dr. William Wexler told the 1,200 delegates that, while there must be no ignoring or condoning of chauvinistic "Black Power" discrimina-

tion against Jews, Jews must have compassion for Negro aspirations."

WASHINGTON (Special)-The son of one of several thousand American Jewish Legionnaires who fought in the Judaean Battalions in World War I-a military hero in his own right-will be the main speaker at the concluding banquet of the 71st convention of the Zionist Organization of America honoring the Golden Jubilee of the Jewish Legion of World War I, Sunday evening, Sept. 15 at the Statler Hilton Hotel, Washington.

General Itzhak Rabin, Israel Ambassador to the United States and hero of the Six-Day War, son of Nehemiah Rabin, an American Legionnaire, will address the banquet composed of 1200 ZOA delegates and his father's friends who in World War I fought in the then Palestine.

The ZOA conclave which runs Sept. 12-15, will feature top Israeli and American leaders, including Israel Deputy Prime Minister Yigal Allon.

Strike at Rush Hour

The carefully planned bomb attack took place around noon when the bus terminal was packed with passengers, Arabs as well as Jews, and adjacent streets were filled with pedestrians and weekday traffic. Police cordoned off the area and tried to protect Arabs, many of whom sought shelter in police

Some 300 Arabs were questioned and released and a handful held for further investigation. Among them were two of the four youths who had planted the bombs. They identified their associates, one of whom was picked up later in East Jerusalem while a search was pressed for the fourth.

From leads given during the interrogation, additional arrests were made, bringing the total up to 18. These men, their fugitive leaders and other suspects were said by police to have been responsible for the bombing of the Orient Cafe in Jerusalem, the attempted bombing of the American Consulate in East Jerusalem and the planting of grenades in trash-cans in Jerusalem.

Cordon Traps Terrorists

In a three-hour press conference police officials ascribed their success in capturing the gang to the fact that the speedy cordon thrown around the area enabled them to catch two of the men who actually planted the bombs. One of them Abdul Latif Kemal, leader of the bombing squad, freely cooperated with police and gave them names and addresses of his associates.

Kemal told them, police said, that the four bombers got their final instructions from Paking In

instructions from Rahim Jaber the day before the bombing. Through an error, fuses on the bombs were incorrectly set so the bombers did not have time to get away before the explosions.

4 Arab Leaders Deported

Four Arab leaders, one a woman, were deported last Friday for incitement to terrorism, on orders of Defense Minister Moshe Dayan and the West Bank military gov-ernor. The four were Miss Zleikha Shehabi, Dr. Daoud al Husseina, Kamal Dajjani, all of Jerusalem, and Yasser Amre of Hebron. They bring the total deported by

Israeli authorities since the June

war to 11.

Prime Minister Levi Eshkol thanked the public for preventing widening of rioting against Arab residents by infuriated Jews. He took pains to praise those Jews who protected innocent Arab citi-zens from attacks by "hoodlums."

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Synagogue Council Rejects NYU President's 'Apology'

NEW YORK (WNS)—Reacting to a statement by Dr. James M. Hester, president of New York University, in defense of retaining an accused anti-Semite as director of the Martin Luther King Afro. of the Martin Luther King Afro-American Student Center, the Synagogue Council of America called it "unpardonably imprudent and insensitive" and an "apologia" for a "scurrilous anti-Semitic article."

The controversy arose over the university's naming to the post of John F. Hatchett, a dismissed Harlem teacher who had been accused by Jewish and non-Jewish groups of venting anti-Semitic attitudes in a published article.

The Synagogue Council said it was particularly perturbed that Dr. Hester found it necessary to defend Hatchett's article instead of attempting to justify the appointment by saying that the article did not reflect what NYU believes to

"I believe," he "that all forms of varieties of anti-Semitism are abhorrent and I strenuously oppose anti-Semitism wherever it appears."

Earlier, Dr. Hester denied that the Hatchett article, which had been denounced by Jewish and other groups as being anti-Jewish, was in fact anti-Semitic.



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The Hatchett Affair

IN THE CAUSE CELEBRE that has become known as the Hatchett Affair, there has been a series of pained protests and ponderous ripostes, the former from Jewish and interfaith sources, the latter from Dr. James M. Hester, the president of New York University, which named John F. Hatchett director of the Martin Luther King Jr. Afro-American Student Center at NYU.

At the time the appointment was announced, late in July, NYU officials were—it was subsequently learned—completely unaware that Hatchett, a substitute teacher in a Harlem public school, had written an article in December 1967 for a publication called the Afro-American Teachers Forum, which he titled "The Phenomenon of the Anti-Black Jews and the Black Anglo-Saxon: A Study in Educational Perfidy." The article began with these paragraphs:

We are witnessing today in New York City a phenomenon that spells death for the minds and souls of our black children. It is the systematic coming of age of the Jews who dominate and control the educational bureaucracy of the New York public school system and their power-starved imitators, the Black Anglo-Saxons.

It is the avowed thesis of this paper that this coalition or collusion, or whatever one chooses to call it, is one of the fundamental reasons why our black children are being educationally castrated, individually and socially devastated to the extent that they are incapable of participating in, and carrying through to a reasonable conclusion, meaningful educational experience. In short, our children are being mentally poisoned .

THESE SENTIMENTS have, with utter justice, been damned as "black nazism." This attitude has, with compelling cogency, been termed a disqualifier of Hatchett for the sensitive post to which he has been named and in which—despite the protests—he is being retained.

Curiously, the several defenses Dr. Hester has made both of his client and the appointment have deepened the sense of rejection the community feels about a man who spouts a "spot" form of classic (and totally discredited) anti-Semitism. Most offensive of all has been Dr. Hester's woeful and dangerous naivette in asserting that in his view Hatchett's article wasn't anti-Semitic-ignorant as he is that the long, sordid history of anti-Semitism is pockmarked with the wheezy defense of the anti-Semite: that the Jew is singled out for scurrilous attack not for his Jewishness but for the "objective" sins attributed to him.

Dr. Hester compounded his hurtful assertions with the out-of-focus observation that Jewish teachers-the object of Hatchett's blows-had left themselves open to attack by organizing themselves into the Jewish Teachers Association. "In this way," says the head of a great university serving a population which includes the largest Jewish community in the world, "they have drawn attention to the fact that they are Jewish teach-

We call Dr. Hester's attention to the elementary truth that, on the contrary, they are not Jewish teachers but teachers who are Jews. To our mind only those men and women who teach Jewish subjects, under Jewish educational auspices, are Jewish teachers. And Dr. Hester's further insistence that Hatchett was not criticizing "Jews as Jews" but rather "teachers who happened to be Jewish" is totally belied by Hatchett's own words, which have been cited in part above. Unhappily and unfortunately, we know an anti-Semite when we hear one, see one, and feel the familiar blow of his biased, hate-warped weapon.

THE SYNAGOGUE COUNCIL of America, the very symbol of authoritative and responsible American Jewry, has felt called upon in this woeful affair to join the issue. In deeply pained tones, the Council has condemned Dr. Hester's public remarks as "unpardonably imprudent—an insensitive defense of a scurrilous anti-Semitic article." Another highly placed Jewish spokesman has termed that defense a "tortured and outrageous effort to de-odorize Hatchett's noxious anti-Semitism."

We don't want to leave the impression that Jews feel that Dr. Hester himself is anti-Semitic. Far, far from it. We accept without qualifi-cation his statement that he finds "all forms and varieties of anti-Semitism abhorrent"-and that he strenuously opposes anti-Semitism wherev-

But we think he is wrong in his decision to retain Hatchett. For the heart of this dreadfully unpleasant issue is that a man who so roughly and assaultively indicts Jews who are teachers for "mentally poisoning Negro pupils in the public schools" can hardly be trusted with the stewardships of a highly sensitive race-relations enterprise.

Announcement by the Joint Distribution Committee that it had allocated the sum of \$100,000 for aid to Jewish refugees in Austria from Czechoslovakia is not only a tribute to the eternal watchfullness of that unique agency, but a painful reminder that the era of refugees is unfortunately not yet over and that we must not relax in maintaining the structures of succor that have been the pride of Jewish life in America in this cen-

We actually know little of what is happening to the Jewish community in Czechoslovakia - how many have taken to the familiar wanderer's cane, nor how many of those who left plan to return or leave for safe abodes elsewhere in the world, including Israel.

What we do know is that some 780 Jews from tragic Czechoslova-kia have applied for assistance to the JDC office in Vienna and that they had found there open doors and healing hands in the best of the Jewish tradition of mercy.

We must of course be hopeful that the tragedy of Jewish refu-gees in Europe will not repeat itself. But given the current climate of fear there against the back-ground of the madness in Moscow, we must be prepared for any eventuality in the countries of Eastern Europe over which the red shadows of Moscow are lurking

Dr. Berger cited estimates that 35 to 40 percent of the partici-pants in the hippie center of Haight-Asbury in San Francisco had been Jewish, in asserting that the Jewish "profile was never more fragile than now." He declared that "a decade ago Jewish youth was not involved with sex or drug escapades, alcoholism, suicide charts and negative social reactions" but now "a Jewish youth problem is beginning to manifest itself."

Dr. Berger, who headed a delegation of 13 Jewish camp directors, spoke at the close of a four-day study of the 27-year-old Institute's methods in helping Jewish college students rediscover Judaism's meaning in the modern world. He lauded the camp as an important "pilot project" in using contemporary techniques in efforts to reinvolve Jewish youth in a heritage "that heretofore has protected strong family ties and healthy social patterns among the young.

Change of Scene

Moviegoers around the United States remember her in the role of the aged Jewish woman whose business is taken over by the Nazis in the Academy Award-winning Czech film, "The Shop on Main Street."

New York theatergoers remember her as the guiding spirit of the Jewish State Theater of Poland which played on West 41st Street last year, breathing nostalgic life into the dying Second Avenue Yiddish theater tradition here.

Now Miss Ida Kaminska, at 68 a distinguished international actress in the grand manner, has declared her intention of settling in the United States. When a Jewish actress or intellectual leaves Poland today, lengthy explanations are hardly necessary. Memory of the recent past and freedom in the political present are reasons enough.

Perhaps the anachronistic Jewish State Theater will continue to exist in Poland without its manag-ing director. Surely the Yiddish stage in New York will receive a boost in its periodic efforts at revival by the presence of Miss Kaminska.-New York Times.

Candles in the Wind

A determination to open doors rather than open fire is apparent in several recent developments bearing more or less directly on the Israel-Arab conflict. still provisional, perhaps, that sense of purpose can help to open minds long closed by savage strife in the Middle East.

One heartening sign was the release of the remaining passengers and crewmen of the Israeli air-liner hijacked by Arab commandos last month and forced down

Another encouragement is the outcome of private contacts be-

tween Spain and the United Arab Republic: hundreds of Sephardic Jewish families in Egypt, anxious to emigrate, were supplied with Spanish passports and have left for new homes in other countries. Quiet intermediation by UN Secretary General Thant was of major influence in both of these cases.

Finally Israel's decision to re-sort to the UN Security Council rather than to counterforce in the aftermath of a new Arab raid across the Suez Canal represents a fresh appeal to reason and diplomacy, the calm tone of the Israeli and Arab diplomats in the Council debates so far is also re-

It is doubtless too early to project dramatic moves toward peace as arising from these limited suc-cesses. But in a real sense, no diplomatic victory in the Middle East is a small one and there may be renewed hope not only for Ambassador Jarring's peace mission but also for the spirit of conciliation upon which it depends.

**LUCKY I 'BROUGHT' BRAND GRANDMA FROM ROMANIA

When this writer came to America at the age of two or three months, a fellow passenger on the

Cunard liner Astoria, accompanying the family all the way from Braila, Romania, to Minneapolis, was the grandmother of Judge Irving R. Brand, 4300 Forest Road. In a s m uch as

Brand will be 50 this December, we have to admit that journey was some time ago. However, we claim vicarious credit (over the judge's protests) for his contributions to our Jewish and general communities, be-cause, after all, he wouldn't be here if his grandmother hadn't come, would he?

This writer also will accept the credit (or is it blame?) for getting Brand involved in Jewish National Fund campaigns. The judge steered the Hubert Humphrey Forest fund-raising effort in 1960, with Judge Archie Gingold as co-chairman, which raised some \$47,000. Brand then played a major role in the all-time record \$80,000-plus JNF campaign which honored Jay Phillips, with Humphrey as guest speaker. Then he lent his good name to a JNF "thank you" campaign which raised funds for an Irving Brand forest in Israel. As one who has received the same honor and as a past president of the Minneapolis JNF Council, I testify under oath that Israel would have at least 100,000 fewer trees today if it hadn't been for Brand's dedicated campaigning.

But other Jewish organizations also owe him a debt of thanks. He is serving his second year as president of Adath Jeshurun synagogue after many years as vice president and board member. His board and vice presidency terms begin-ning in 1952 were interrupted, Judge Brand says, "for time to

rear five children properly," with the help of his wife, the former Ruth Miller. Mrs. Brand is a forboard member of Brandeis and Mount Sinai Hospital women's auxiliaries. Their children are Judith, 13, now in junior high; Johanna, 12, Jonathan, 10 and Jethra, 8, in Fern Hill school, and Joshua, 4, an Adath Jeshurun nursery school pupil.

Brand, a graduate of Adams and South High schools, received University of Minnesota degrees in 1941 and 1943, and served on the Minnesota Law Review student editorial board and as its president. He still does some writing for pub lication, having been a contribu-tor to Modern Medicine and Dental Survey magazines since 1961. His name, as chairman and co-author, is on the cover of a Minnesota guide book for uniform instructing of juries in district and municipal courts.

He now practices law with the Builders Exchange firm of Maslon, Kaplan, Edelman, Borman, Brand and McNulty, but finds time to teach at the University of Minnesota—as Law School adjunct pro-fessor since 1966 (he had been an instructor since 1953), and in the School of Dentistry since 1947 as professorial lecturer on ethics and jurisprudence. Brand was admitted to practice in the Minnesota Su-preme Court in 1960.

BRAND HAD the honor of being appointed to judgeships by both a Republican and Democratgovernor. Gov. Luther Youngdahl named him municipal judge in Minneapolis in 1951, a post he held until 1955, when Gov. Orville Freeman elevated him to the fourth district court. He served as district judge until 1966, when he resumed private practice. A pleb-iscite of Hennepin County Bar Association members led to Brand's municipal court appointment, when he ranked near the top in a list of 26 lawyers suggested for the post.

Freeman, a law school class-mate of Brand's who is now Sec-retary of Agriculture in Washington, whispered to Brand during cornerstone laying ceremonies for Hillel House, which the judge served as president and building committee chairman, that: "I am appointing you to the district court." Brand first cut his teeth on judicial work as law clerk for Eighth Circuit Judge Seth Thomas in the U.S. Court of Appeals in 1943-44 and the following year he was a Justice Department civil division associate attorney. He spent the next two years in Chicago law practice, followed by two years' practice in the Rand Tower and two more with Karlins, Grossfrom some pulpits this Sabbath, and Sam Scheiner, director of the Jewish Community Relations Council of Minnesota, also supports the effort. 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

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

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Dinner Dance Sept. 21 to Mark CJW Anniversary

The celebration of a 75th Anniversary, creates the obligation to discover answers to many questions. This was soon learned by Mrs. Bert Hoffman, editor-in-chief of "The 75th Anniversary History" of the St. Paul section of the Council of Jewish Women. The high point of the local Diamond Jubilee celebration will be the dinner dance Saturday evening, Sept. 21, at Hillcrest Country Club.

In the early planning stages Mrs. Hoffman and her committee divided their quest into two areasartifacts and archives. They were able to discover the whereabouts of a fund-raising tablecloth, embroidered with 750 names, and used on special occasions from 1940-1960, the year it "went into hiding." Commenting on the cloth, Mrs. Hoffman said "A special section was devoted to names of grandchildren. Today, those very grandchildren are married, have families, and the women are active members of CJW." A second artifact, reflecting Council's policy of inaugurating projects later accepted by the community, was an antique doll dressed by a Council member, used at "Mend-A-Heart" luncheons, fund raising project for the Rheumatic Fever clinic in the 1950's, now a part of Wilder Clin-

Other items for the archives were found in many locations, including the Historical society, and the American Jewish World office. They consisted of Minute books from 1917, Yearbooks, dating from 1916, annual reports of chairmen and presidents, written in their own handwriting, from 1920-35, pictures, and two well-filled scrap books, to add to the two already in Council's possession.

A permanent home will now be found for the artifacts and archives brought together for the Anniversary, Mrs. Lewis Harris and Mrs. Bert Hoffman will welcome any further items pertaining to the early years of the St. Paul section Council of Jewish Women.

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
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

Mansfield: No Bias In Fortas Fight

WASHINGTON (JTA)-Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield, of Montana, insisted in a television interview that there was "absolutely no anti-Semitism" involved in the continuing attacks on the nomination of Supreme Court Associate Justice Abe Fortas as Chief Justice. Sen. Mansfield, who leads forces seeking approval of the Fortas nomination, was asked about the factor of anti-Semitism. A newsman pointed out that President Johnson last weekend raised this question when he depicted a similarity in the opposition to Justice Fortas to the campaign against confirmation of the late Louis D. Brandeis, first Jew ever to serve on the Supreme Court.


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
